Warsaw, December 8.

THE Diet continues their Deliberations with the greatest Tranquility: They have confirmed all the Acts that have been made during the Interreign; and are at present chiefly employed in arranging the Taxes which are to be levied on the different Orders of the Republick, and in taking Measures to improve the Revenues, and to ensure the Inland Commerce.

Venice, December 14. According to the freshest Advices which the Magistrates of Health have just received from Dalmatia, the Plague was spread into two more Villages, and an Hamlet, in the Territory of Knin, and into two Villages in the District of Sign; but nothing new had happened in the two Villages, where it was already, in the Territory of Knin.

Genoa, December 17. On the 13th several Transports, with French Troops on Board, arrived at Bastia; but as M. de Marbeuf was not arrived, the Troops had not begun to land.
