BARON Stutterheim, who was some Time ago named Envoy Extraordinary from this Court to That of Berlin, set out Yesterday for his Place of Residence. Count Sternberg, the Imperial Minister, has taken his Audiences of Leave, and goes from hence on Tuesday Morning. Prince Charles is perfectly recovered, and goes Tomorrow to Hubertsburg, for three or four Days, on a Hunting Party.

Berlin, December 22. Last Tuesday his Royal Highness Prince Henry, the King of Prussia's Brother, arrived here from the Tour he had made to Brunswick and Hamburgh.

Baron Stutterheim, Minister to this Court from That of Dresden, arrived here on the 20th Instant; and Yesterday Morning he had his first Audience of the King of Prussia, and delivered his Letters of Credence.

Last Night Major General Nugent, who is to re-place General Reidt as Minister to this Court from That of Vienna, arrived here.

Thursday last there was a Grand Meeting of the Members of the Royal Academy of this Place, when the Princes Frederick Augustus, and William Adolphus of Brunswick, who are in the Prussian Service, were chosen and received, with great Solemnity, Members of the said Academy. Their Serene Highnesses pronounced, each, a short Harangue, on this Occasion.
