IN the last Week an Edict was published here, to reduce the current Value of the Roman small Silver Coin Five per Cent. as what has been coined at Rome for Twenty Years past, is deficient both in Quality and Weight. Notice has been sent from Leghorne, that Two Vessels, with French Troops on Board, had been obliged to put into that Port, the whole Convoy designed for Corsica having been dispersed: Seven others put into Port Ferrario, the Governor of which Place offered Leave to the French Officers to land the Troops there; but they did not chuse to accept of it, in Hopes every Day of being able to put to Sea again.

They write from Rome, that the Prince Doria, who, besides his own vast Possessions, inherited, a few Years ago, the greatest Part of the Panfil Estate, died last Week; as did likewise the Duke of Sforza Cesarini.

Berlin, January 5. M. de Reidt, the Austrian Minister at this Court, having had his Audience of Leave, proposes to set out from hence for Vienna in a very few Days. The King of Prussia has made him a Present of a Gold Snuff Box, with his Majesty's Picture in it.

A few Days ago his Majesty gave publickly at Court his Picture, richly set in Diamonds, to Prince Dolgoruki, the Russian Minister at this Court.

Last Thursday M. de Goudowitz, Major General in the Russian Service, arrived here from Paris, in his Way to Peterburgh.
