The KING's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

HIS Majesty in Council was this Day pleased to appoint John Griffith, of Cefn-Amwlch, Esq; to be Sheriff of the County of Carnarvon.

Naples, January 8. On Sunday last his Sicilian Majesty took the Diversion of Shooting on the Lake Aniano, about three Miles from this Capital.

Genoa, January 19. The French Troops having taken Possession of Calvi and Ajaccio in Corsica, the Republick's Troops are arrived from those Places; and those that are in Garrison at Bastia are soon expected. The French Troops were arrived, and waited for M. Marbeuf, who sailed from Leghorn the 12th Instant.

Lisbon, January 19. Their most Faithful Majesties, and the Royal Family, set out for Salvaterra To-day, where they will reside, as usual, until the first Week in Lent. M. da Cunha accompanies their Majesties; and the Count de Oeyras will follow in a few Days.

Madrid, January 21. His Catholick Majesty, who has been indisposed for some Days, is now perfectly recovered. Last Week died here the Marquis de Munez Campo Villar, who was one of the Secretaries of State, and Minister of Grace and Justice. His Catholick Majesty has appointed Don Emanuel de Roda, Minister from this Court at Rome, to be his Successor.

Vienna, January 23. On Monday last the Emperor and Empress set out to meet the Queen of the Romans; but the Empress went no farther than Molck; and Yesterday their Imperial Majesties, with the King and Queen of the Romans, dined at a Country House of Prince Kevenhuller's; and in the Evening arrived at Schonbrun, where the whole Palace was finely illuminated. This Afternoon the Nuptial Benediction will be given. The Court will remain this Week at Schonbrun; and there will be every Day some Spectacle acted either by

the Arch-Dutcheffes, or some of the principal Nobility.

Venice, January 25. On the 15th Instant, a publick and solemn Religious Procession and Thanksgiving were made here, on Account of the Ranfom of Ninety-one Slaves from the States of Algiers and Tunis. Each of the Slaves was accompanied in the Procession with a noble Venetian on his Left Hand, and the Patriarch of Venice walked before them. High Mass and Te Deum were sung in the Church of St. Salvatore; after which the Slaves were entertained at Dinner in the Refectory of that Convent of Regular Canons, and were served at Table by the Noble Venetians that attended them in the Procession.

According to the last Advices from Dalmatia, of the 10th Instant, received by the Magistrates of Health, the Plague continued to decrease, only two Persons having died of it in fourteen Days in the District of Knin, and Nine in sixteen Days in that of Sign. The Plague was also declining in the Turkish Province of Bosnia; but it was broke out in the Cities of Janina and Arta in Epirus near the Venetian Frontiers, which obliged the Proveditor-General to take the necessary Precautions for preventing its being carried into the Frontier Towns of Prevesa and Vonizza, or other Places belonging to this Republick. The Epidemical Distemper amongst the Horned Cattle continued in the Neighbourhood of Zara; and there is some Suspicion of an Epidemical Distemper among the Dogs in Civita Vecchia, which may be dangerous to the human Species.

PURSUANT to an Act of Parliament passed in the Twenty Sixth Year of His late Majesty's Reign, this is to give Notice to the Concerned, that Information has been sent to this Office, That on the 13th of December last, the Sloop Prosperous, of Chichester, whereof Thomas Howell was Master, bound from Milford to Poole in Dorsetshire, laden with Stone, Coals and Butter, by contrary Winds was obliged to put into Grimsby, one of the Harbours at Scilly; and on the 9th of January, the Wind blowing excessive hard, about Two o'Clock in the Afternoon, her best Bower parted, the Sheet Anchor being down at the same Time; but having a long Scope, the Vessel tailed on Shore; by which Accident she received very great Damage, the Water filling her every Tide; That



on the Morning of the 11th, between Four and Five o'Clock the Wind blowing a Storm, and the Bitts of the Windlafs giving Way, the Vessel was drove from thence to an uninhabited Island called Tean, about half a League from Old Grimsby, where she broke to Pieces, but the greatest Part of the Cargo, and some of the Materials of the Vessel are saved.
