*Petersburgh, January 16.*

**O**N Tuesday last the Earl of Buckingham, His Britannick Majesty's Ambassador Extraordinary and Plenipotentiary to this Court, had his Audience of Leave of her Imperial Majesty; and his Excellency proposes leaving this Place on Monday next, on his Return to England.

*Genoa, January 26.* Late on the 19th Instant, an Express arrived from Bastia, with Letters dated the 14th, which mention that M. Marbeuf arrived there on the 12th; and that on the 14th and 15th, the French Troops were to take Possession of all the Posts belonging to the City, which had hitherto been covered by those of the Republick.

On the 21st Instant, three Ships arrived here from Bastia with about 600 Men, Part of the Republick's Troops of that Garrison.

Yesterday the Small Council chose M. Rovere One of the Six, out of which the Doge is to be elected. The Small Council will meet again on Tuesday, to chuse two other Candidates; and, if they are chosen, the Great Council will meet the next Day to elect the Doge.
