Á PROCLAMATION;

Requiring Paffes, formerly granted to Ships and Veffels trading in the Way of the Cruizers belonging to the Governments on the Coaft of Barbary, to be returned into the Office of the Admiralty of Great Britain; and other Paffes; of different Forms, to be iffued.

GEORGE R.

HEREAS Our Royal Grandfather, of glorious Memory, by His Proclamation, bearing Date the Twentyninth Day of March, in the Twen-

ty-third Year of His Reign, did charge and command all His loving Subjects, who then were, or should be possessed of any Passes for Ships and Veffels belonging to His faid late Majefty's Subjects trading to Portugal, the Canaries, Guinea, the Indies, into the Mediter-ranean, or elswhere, in the Way of the Cruizers of the Government of Algiers, (except fuch Paffes as had been granted to Ships gone or going to the Eaft Indies, or other remote Voyages, where they could not be timely furnished with new Passes) that they should, within the Space of Two Years, to be computed from the First Day of April then next, return the fame, and furnish themselves with Passes of a new Form, under the Hands and Seals of the Commillioners for Executing the Office of High Admiral of Great Britain and Ireland, in lieu thereof, for their feveral Ships and Veffels, in fuch Manner as by the faid recited Proclamation was directed : And whereas it hath been humbly reprefented unto Us, that it may have happened, that during the late War, feveral Paffes, granted purfuant to the faid recited Proclamation, may either by Accident or undue Means have fallen into the Hands of Foreigners, who, by Colour of fuch Paffes, may carry on their Trade; We, taking the Premifes into Our Royal Confideration, and judging it neceffary to put a fpeedy Stop to all fuch indirect Practices, which do not only tend to the Prejudice of our trading Subjects, but may occasion a Mifunderstanding be--tween Us and the Governments on the Coaft of Barbary; for Preventing thereof, have thought fit, by the Advice of Our Privy Council, to publish this Our Royal Proclamation; and do hereby declare, That all fuch Paffes of the prefent Form now in being, shall not continue in Force longer than till the First Day of February, One thousand seven hundred and fixty-fix (except fuch Paffes as have been granted to Ships gone or going to the East Indies, or other remote Voyages, where they cannot be timely furnished with new Paffes; and that in such Cafe the Paffes of the prefent Form do continue in Force for Two Years from and after the faid First Day of February, One thousand seven hundred and fixty-fix:) And We do hereby flrictly charge and command all our loving Sub-

jects, who are, or shall be possessed of any such Passes, that they do, before the First Day of February, One thousand feven hundred and fixty fix, return the fame (except fuch as are before excepted) into the Office of the Admiralty of Great Britain, or to the respective Collectors of Our Customs, at the Out-Ports of Great Britain and Ireland, or to the Governors of fome of Our foreign Plantations or Dominions, in order to their being cancelled; and that they do furnish themselves with Passes of a new Form, under the Hands and Seals of Our Commissioners for Executing the Office of High Admiral of Great Britain and Ireland, in lieu thereof, for their feveral Skips and Veffels, according to the Treaties fublifting between Us and the faid Governments on the Coaft of Barbary, and the Regulations made by Our Royal Predeceffor King George the First, by Order in his Privy Council, on the Fourteenth Day of June, in the Year One thousand seven hundred and twentytwo, and Our Inftructions given to Our faid Commissioners for Executing the Office of High Admiral of Great Britain and Ireland touching the fame; And whereas many Ships and Veffels belonging to our loving Subjects continue feveral Years trading from Port to Port in the Mediterranean, without returning Home, whereby they cannot fo conveniently procure their Paffes to be exchanged; We do hereby, for the Eafe: of our trading Subjects, publish and declare Our Pleafure, that upon the Application of any Owner of any Ship or Veflel, or other fubftantial Merchant, to the Office of the Admiralty of Great Britain, and Oath made by him of the Property of fuch Ship or Veffel, and that Three Fourths of the Company are Our Subjects, according to an Act made in the Twelfth Year of the Reign of Our Royal Predeceffor King Charles the Second, (intitled, An Act for encouraging and increasing of Shipping and Navigation) and upon entering into the usual Band for the Return of such Pass at the End of the Voyage, it fhall and may be lawful for Our Commissioners for Executing the Office of High Admiral of Great Britain and Ireland, or Our High Admiral of Great Britain and Ireland for the Time being, and they are respectively empowered, to make out a new País for fuch Ship. or Vessel, and send the same to such of Our Confuls in the Medirerranean, as the faid Owner or Merchant shall defire, with Direction to such Conful, that upon Application to him from the Mafter of the Ship for which the Pafs is made out, and furrendering up his old Pafs, and entering into a like Bond for the Return of fuch new País, he fhall deliver out the faid new País to fuch Mafter, and transmit the old one, with the Bond, to the Office of the Admiralty of Great Britain : And in order more effectually to hinder, for the future, any Abufes that may be attempted by Foreigners relating to the new Passes to be islued as aforefaid; We do hereby further declare Our Royal Will and Pleafure, That all fuch new Paffes
