Naples, January 29.

THERE is no Appearance of Winter here; but the Season has been very rainy.

Genoa, February 2. On the 28th past, the Small Council having elected the Six Persons, out of which the Doge was to be chosen, the Great Council met the next Day the 29th, when M. Francis-Maria Rovere was chosen by a Majority of Thirteen Votes, having 246, and his Competitor M. Sebastian Pallavicino, 233. His Serenity was, the same Day, complimented by the greatest Part of the Nobility of both Sexes, and Two Days after he received the Compliments of the Foreign Ministers and Consuls, and all the Clergy.

Letters from Bastia of the 20th past, say, that the French Troops had taken Possession of all the interior and exterior Works of that City.

Venice, February 8. According to Advices from Dalmatia of the 22d past, only Two Persons have died of the Plague since the preceding Accounts, which were of the 26th of December.

Vienna, February 9. On Thursday Morning the Emperor, the King and Queen of the Romans, the Archduke Leopold, and the four eldest Archduchesses, accompanied by many of the principal Nobility, took the Diversion of a Course de Traineaux in Parade. Count Rosenberg, late Imperial Ambassador to the Republic of Venice, died here a few Days ago.

Berlin, February 12. Last Night his Royal Highness Prince Henry, the King of Prussia's Brother, gave a grand Concert of Musick; at which the Royal Family, the Hereditary Prince of Courland, the Foreign Ministers, and the principal Nobility, were present.

Berlin, February 16. Last Wednesday the Hereditary Prince of Courland went to Potzdum to pay his Court to his Prussian Majesty, and returned last Night.

The King has been pleased to order Letters Patent to be passed under the Great Seal of the Kingdom of Ireland, for constituting and appointing Richard Clayton, Esq; one of His Majesty's Council learned in the Law, Chief Justice
