A PROCLAMATION;

Requiring Passes, formerly granted to Ships and Vessels trading in the Way of the Cruizers belonging to the Governments on the Coast of Barbary, to be returned into the Office of the Admiralty of Great Britain; and other Paffes, of different Forms, to be iffued.

GEORGE R. THEREAS Our Royal Grandfather, of glorious Memory, by His Proclamation, bearing Date the Twentyninth Day of March, in the Twen-

ty-third Year of His Reign, did charge and command all His loving Subjects, who then were, or fhould be poffelfed of any Paffes for Ships and Veffels belonging to His faid late Majefty's Subjects trading to Portugal, the Canaries, Guinea, the Indies, into the Mediterranean, or elfwhere, in the Way of the Cruizers of the Government of Algiers, (except fuch Passes as had been granted to Ships gone or going to the East Indies, or other remote Voyages, where they could not be timely furnished with new Paffes) that they fhould, within the Space of Two Years, to be computed from the First Day of April then next, return the same, and furnish themselves with Passes of a new Form, under the Hands and Seals of the Commiffioners for Executing the Office of High Admiral of Great Britain and Ireland, in lieu thereof, for their feveral Ships and Veffels, in fuch Manner as by the faid recircd Proclamation was directed : And whereas it hath been humbly reprefented unto Us, that it may have happened, that during the late War, feveral Paffes, granted purfuant to the faid recited Proclamation, may either by Accident or undue Means have fallen into the Hands of Foreigners, who, by Colour of fuch Passes, may carry on their Trade; We, taking the Premifes into Our Royal Confideration, and judging it necessary to put a speedy Stop to all fuch indirect Practices, which do not only tend to the Frejudice of our trading Subjects, but may occasion a Misunderstanding be tween Us and the Governments on the Coaft of Barbary; for Preventing thereof, have thought fit, by the Advice of Our Privy Council, to publifh this Our Royal Proclamation; and do hereby declare, That all fuch Paffes of the prefent Form now in being, shall not continue in Force longer than till the First Day of February, One thousand seven hundred and fixty-fix (except fuch Paffes as have been granted to Ships | gone or going to the East Indics, or other remote Voyages, where they cannot be timely furnished with new Passes; and that in such Case the Pattes of the prefent Form do continue in Force for Two Years from and after the faid First Day of February, One thousand seven hundred and fixty-fix:) And We do hereby ftrictly charge and command all our loving Sub-

jects, who are, or fhall be poffeffed of any fuch Paffes, that they do, before the First Day of February, One thousand seven hundred and fixty fix, return the fame (except fuch as are before excepted) into the Office of the Admiralty of Great Britain, or to the refpective Collectors of Our Customs, at the Out-Ports of Great Britain and Ireland, or to the Governors of fome of Our foreign Plantations or Dominions, in order to their being cancelled ; and that they do furnish themselves with Passes of a new Form, under the Hands and Seals of Our Commiffioners for Executing the Office of High Admiral of Great Britain and Iseland, in lieu thereof, for their feveral Ships and Veffels, according to the Treaties subfifting between Us and the faid Governments on the Coast of Barbary, and the Regulations-made by Our Royal Predeceffor King George the First, by Order in his Privy Council, on the Fourteenth Day of June, in the Year One thousand seven hundred and twentytwo, and Our Instructions given to Our faid Commifficuers for Executing the Office of High Admiral of Great Britain and Ireland touching the fame : And whereas many Ships and Veffels belonging to our loving Subjects continue leveral Years trading from Port to Port in the Mediterranean, without returning Home, whereby they cannot fo conveniently procure their Paffes to be exchanged; We do hereby, for the Eafe of our trading Subjects, publish and declare Our Pleasure, that upon the Application of any Owner of any Ship or Vessel, or other substantial Merchant, to the Office of the Admiralty of Great Britain, and Oath made by him of the Property of fuch Ship or Veffel, and that Three Fourths of the Company are Our Subjects, according to an Act made in the Twelfth Year of the Reign of Our Royal Predeceffor King Charles the Second, (intitled, An Act for encouraging and increasing of Shipping and Navigation) and upon entering into the usual Bond for the Return of fuch Pais 2t the End of the Voyage, it shall and may be lawful for Our Commiffioners for Executing the Office of High Admiral of Great Britain and Ireland, or Our High Admiral of Great Britain and Ireland for the Time being, and they are respectively empowered, to make out a new Pafs for fuch Ship or Veffel, and fend the fame to fuch of Our Confuls in the Mediterranean, as the faid Gwner or Merchant shall defire, with Direction to fuch Conful, that upon Application to him from the Mafter of the Ship for which the Pafs is made out, and furrendering up his old Pafs, and entering into a like Bond for the Return of fuch new País, he shall deliver out the faid new País to fuch Mafter, and transmit the old one, with the Bond, to the Office of the Admiralty of Great Britain : And in order more effectually to hinder, for the future, any Abufes that may be attempted by Foreigners relating to the new Paffes to be iffued as aforefaid ; We do hereby further declare Our Royal Will and Pleafure, That all fuch new

Passes, to be hereafter issued for any Ships or Veffels whatfoever, belonging to any of Our Subjects of the Island of Minorca or Gibraltar, shall be made out in a peculiar Form, different from the Form of the new Paffes to be iffued for Ships and Veffels belonging to any other Part of Our Dominions; and that fuch new Paffes shall be lodged with the respective Governors, Lieutenant Governors, or Commanders in Chief for the Time being, of the faid Ifland of Minorca and Gibraltar, and iffued out only by them according to the Regulations made by Our faid Royal Predeceffor King George the First, in Council as aforefaid : And the faid respective Governors, Lieutenant Governors, and Com-manders in Chief, are hereby charged and required not to illue or deliver out any fuch Paffes to any Perfons whatfoever, other than fuch as are really Our Subjects, inhabiting in the faid Island of Minorca or Gibraltar respectively; and flrictly to conform themfelves to the Regulations and Inftructions made and given as aforefaid : But in regard it fometimes happens that Ships, belonging to our Subjects of other Parts of Our Dominions, call in at Minorca and Gibraltar without Paffes, and have Occasion to be furnished therewith; We do, for the further Conveniency of Trade, hereby publish and declare Our Royal Will and Pleasure, that it shall and may be lawful for Our Commiffioners for Executing the Office of High Admiral of Great Britain and Ireland, or Our High Admiral of Great Britain and Ireland for the Time being, and they are respectively hereby empowered to lodge Mediterranean Paffes, of the fame Form with the new Palfes for Ships and Veffels, belonging to any other Part of Our Dominions, in the Hands of Our Governors, Lieutenant-Governors, or Commanders in Chief of Mi-norca and Gibraltar, with Directions to them to iffue and deliver out fuch Paffes, to any of Our Subjects, not being Inhabitants of the faid Island of Minorca or of Gibraltar; provided the Perfon or Perfons applying for the fame, do comply with and conform to the feveral Rules and Regulations now in Use, and required to be observed by such our other Subjects : And We do hereby Order, that the Commissioners of Our Cuffoms in Great Britain, and the Commiffioners of Our Revenue in Ireland, do caufe to be carried into Execution fuch Parts of the Order of Council of the Fourteenth Day of June, One thousand seven hundred and twentytwo, concerning Passes, as relate to themselves, and the proper Officers under them; and that they do direct their Officers in the feveral Ports of Our Kingdoms of Great Britain and Ireland, to demand of the Mafters of all Merchant Ships, fo foon as they fhall return into Port from a Foreign Voyage, all Paffes granted as aforefaid, which shall be in their Pof-feffion, to be produced to the faid respective Officers of Our Cuftoms; and that if the fame shall appear to be of an older Date than Twelve Months, for Ships and Veffels trading on this Side the Streights Mouth, or for Ships and Veffels trading to a greater Diftance, in Cafe the Voyages of fuch laft-mentioned Ships and Veffels shall be determined ; then such Passes shall be delivered up to the faid respective Officers of Our Cuffoms, and be by them returned to the Office of the Admiralty of Great Britain: And in Cafe the Mafter of any fuch Ship or Veffel shall refuse to produce or deliver up such Paffes, according to the true Intent of Our faid

Order, then the faid Officers shall certify the Name of every fuch Master, and of the Ship or Veffel, to Our Commiffioners for Executing the Office of High Admiral of Great Britain and Ireland, or to Our High Admiral of Great Britain and Ireland for the Time being; to the End, that Directions may be given for putting the Bond entered into on the Granting any fuch Pafs, in And all Our Governors, Lieutenant-Suit. Governors, and Commanders in Chief of any of Our Islands, Colonies, or Plantations, Confuls reliding in Foreign Parts, and all other Our Officers and Ministers whatsoever, and all other Our loving Subject:, whom it may concern, are hereby expreisly required and commanded to yield due Obedience unto, and frictly to observe, all the Orders, Inftructions, Regulations, and Directions before mentioned, on Pain of Our high Difpleafure.
