Whereas by an Act passed the last Session of Parliament, "The Masters or Owners of each and every Ship or Vessel, laden with or carrying Merchandize, coming to or going from the Harbour of Dublin, (except such as may be laden with Coals or Corn, trading Coast-ways) are obliged to receive and take on Board such Ship or Vessel, a Pilot, licenced as such, and to pay the Rates of Pilotage" as the said Act directs;— The Committee for carrying the said Act into Execution, do hereby give Notice, That all Pilots, who are qualified and licenced in pursuance of the said Act, are provided with Licences, Badges, and printed Instructions, which they are directed to produce to any Master or Owner of a Ship requiring the same, for their Information; and that the Boats of such licenced Pilots are distinguished by a Green Flag, with an Harp and Crown, and a Swallow Tail, at the Picque of the Foresail.
