Lisbon, February 21.

**T**HEIR most Faithful Majesties and the Royal Family enjoy perfect Health at Salvaterra: The Court will return from thence about the 2d of next Month.

On Friday the 15th Instant, a French Vessel, bound from Marseilles to Granville, about Eighty Leagues from hence, met with an English Ship at Sea, from the Island of Grenada, in Distress, and took the Ship's Company on Board, consisting of Seventeen Men, which are brought into this Port, one excepted who died at Sea. On Application made to Captain Reynolds, of His Britannick Majesty's Frigate the Flamborough, to give them a Passage Home, he immediately agreed to it.

His Majesty's Ships the Thames and the Flamborough are ready to put to Sea the first fair Wind, the former for the Streights, the latter for England.

The King George Packet arrived on Thursday the 14th, in nine Days, with one Mail, and the Duke of York Packet, on Monday the 18th, in six Days, likewise with one Mail.

Venice, February 22. The Magistrates of Health have received still more favourable Accounts of the Plague in Dalmatia.

Copenhagen, February 23. The Season is at present exceedingly severe; and there is this Day an Account that a Courier has passed from Norway to Jutland, and across the two Belts, on the Snow, which has not been done for many Years past.
