THE Great Chancellor is expected here To-morrow, having left Riga last Tuesday.

Madrid, March 14.

In consequence of the proposed Marriage between the Prince of Asturias, and the Infanta Donna Louisa of Parma, his Catholick Majesty has made the following Promotions:

In the Household of the Prince of Asturias.

The Duke of Bejar is appointed Mayordomo Mayor; the Duke of Uzeda, Chamberlain; the Duke of Medina-Sidonia, Master of the Horse; the Marquis Dumet, First Equerry.

In the Household of the Princess.

The Prince of Francavilla, Mayordomo Mayor; the Count of Altamira, Master of the Horse; the Marquis of Andia, First Equerry; the Dutchess of Miranda, Camerera Mayor; the Dutchess of Medina-Sidonia, the Marchioness of Arvia, and the Widow Dutchess of Arcos, Ladies of the Bedchamber. The Dutchess of Miranda was at the same Time created a Grandee of Spain of the First Class; which Honour is limited to her Person only.

Stockholm, March 14. The French Ambassadors died here this Day of the Small-Pox.

Berlin, March 19. The King of Prussia is removed from Potzdam to Sans Soucy, where he was taken ill, last Wednesday, with a Feverish Disorder, which confined him to his Room. Prince Frederick of Brunwick is perfectly recovered of the Fall from his Horse.

Berlin, March 23. Some Days ago the Reigning Prince of Anhalt-Deffau returned hither from Potzdam; and last Thursday Morning his Serene Highness set out for Deffau.

The King of Prussia still remains at Sans Soucy, and is confined to his Room by a Fit of the Gout, attended with a slight Fever.

Hague, March 26. Count Hompesch, one of the Nobles of Holland, died here Yesterday, by which several of the most considerable Military Employments are vacant. Their High Mightinesses have appointed the Prince of Nassau Weilbourg to be Governor of Dutch Flanders.

The Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs, in order to bring to Justice the said Offenders, do hereby promise a Reward of 50 l. to any Person or Persons who shall discover and apprehend, or cause to be discovered and apprehended, any one or more of the said Offender or Offenders, over and above any Reward given by Act of Parliament; to be paid by the Receiver-General of His Majesty's Customs on Conviction, for each Person so discovered and convicted: And if any of the said Offender or Offenders do and shall, within three Months from the Date hereof, discover to the said Commissioners two or more of his or their Accomplice or Accomplices, and cause them to be apprehended, so that they may be brought to Justice, and convicted of the said Offence, the said Offender or Offenders so discovering shall be acquitted and discharged from such his or their Offence, and receive the like Reward of 50 l. in pursuance of the Act of the 19th of his late Majesty, to be paid by the Receiver-General of His Majesty's Customs upon Conviction.
