*Vienna, March 20.*

**Y**ESTERDAY, being the Name-Day of the King and Queen of the Romans, was observed with the usual Solemnities: In the Morning their Majesties received the Compliments of the Ambassadors, Foreign Ministers and principal Nobility, and in the Evening there was a Drawing-Room in Grand Gala.

*Berlin, March 26.* The King of Prussia still continues at Sans Soucy, but is said to be pretty well recovered of his late Indisposition.

A few Days ago Count Bohlen, who resided here as Envoy Extraordinary from the Court of Sweden, set out for Stockholm, in order, as is supposed, to assist at the Diet.

Last Saturday Night died here, after a lingering Illness of Five Months, Frederick William Querin de Forcade, Lieut. General, Colonel and Chief of a Regiment of Infantry in the Prussian Service, and one of the Knights of the Order of the Black Eagle. He was in the 67th Year of his Age, and had served the House of Brandenburg with great Honor, Fidelity, and Attachment, during 53 Years. He has left a very numerous Family.

*Hague, April 2.* The Magistrates of the Hague, in Conjunction with the Court of Holland, have forbid the receiving any Person from other Places, to be inoculated for the Small-Pox in this Town; so that a Number of Persons who were come hither, with their Children, from Amsterdam, in order to be inoculated by Dr. Schwencke, a famous Physician of this Place, have been obliged to return Home; and all the Physicians of the Town have had Notice given them of this Resolution.

*St. James's, April 9.*

The King has been pleased to order Letters Patent to be passed under the Great Seal of the Kingdom of Ireland, containing a Grant unto Charles Agar, Clerk, of the Deanry of the Cathedral Church of Kilmore, in the Diocese of Kilmore, vacant by the Promotion of Henry Maxwell, late Dean thereof, to the Bishoprick of Dromore.

Whereas on Sunday the 24th Day of March last, about Eleven of the Clock at Night, a Gang of Smugglers, to the Number of Twenty or thereabouts, armed with Fire-Arms and other offensive Weapons, were assembled on the North Shore near Poole in the County of Dorset, in order to be aiding and assisting in the Carrying away a large Quantity of Tea. And whereas Lieutenant Edward Down, Commander of the Folkestone Cutter, in the Service of the Customs, with several of the Men belonging to the same, were, in endeavouring to seize the said Tea, and in preventing the same being rescued from them after Seizure, forcibly and violently obstructed, hindred, and wounded in the Execution and Discharge of their Duty.

The Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs, in order to bring to Justice the said Offenders, do hereby promise a Reward of 50 l. to any Person or Persons who shall discover and apprehend, or cause to be discovered and apprehended, any one or more of the said Offender or Offenders, over and above any Reward given by Act of Parliament; to be paid by the Receiver-General of His Majesty's Customs on Conviction, for each Person so discovered and convicted: And if any of the said Offender or Offenders do and shall, within three Months from the Date hereof, discover to the said Commissioners two or more of his or their Accomplice or Accomplices, and
