Vienna, March 20.

YESTERDAY, being the Name-Day of the King and Queen of the Romans, was observed with the usual Solemnities: In the Morning their Majesties received the Compliments of the Ambassadors, Foreign Ministers and principal Nobility, and in the Evening there was a Drawing-Room in Grand Gala.

Berlin, March 26. The King of Prussia still continues at Sans Soucy, but is said to be pretty well recovered of his late Indisposition.

A few Days ago Count Bohlen, who resided here as Envoy Extraordinary from the Court of Sweden, set out for Stockholm, in order, as is supposed, to assist at the Diet.

Last Saturday Night died here, after a lingering Illness of Five Months, Frederick William Querin de Forcade, Lieut. General, Colonel and Chief of a Regiment of Infantry in the Prussian Service, and one of the Knights of the Order of the Black Eagle. He was in the 67th Year of his Age, and had served the House of Brandenburg with great Honor, Fidelity, and Attachment, during 53 Years. He has left a very numerous Family.

Hague, April 2. The Magistrates of the Hague, in Conjunction with the Court of Holland, have forbid the receiving any Person from other Places, to be inoculated for the Small-Pox in this Town; so that a Number of Persons who were come hither, with their Children, from Amsterdam, in order to be inoculated by Dr. Schwencke, a famous Physician of this Place, have been obliged to return Home; and all the Physicians of the Town have had Notice given them of this Resolution.

St. James's, April 9.

The King has been pleased to order Letters Patent to be passed under the Great Seal of the Kingdom of Ireland, containing a Grant unto Charles Agar, Clerk, of the Deanry of the Cathedral Church of Kilmore, in the Diocese of Kilmore, vacant by the Promotion of Henry Maxwell, late Dean thereof, to the Bishoprick of Dromore.

HIS Majesty having been pleased by His Royal Proclamation of the 22d of February last, to direct, that Passes of a new Form shall be issued to all His Subjects trading in the Way of the Cruizers belonging to the Governments on the Coast of Barbary; My Lords

Commissioners of the Admiralty do hereby give Notice, that in pursuance of the aforesaid Proclamation, Passes of a new Form will be ready to be issued at this Office from the 1st of May next, to such Persons as shall apply for them, and at His Majesty's Foreign Colonies and Plantations as soon as conveniently may be; but that such Passes of the Old Form as have been issued, will nevertheless continue in Force till the 1st of February 1766.

Several Persons concerned in the illegal Collection and Delivery of Letters and Packets, in various Parts of the Kingdom, have lately been prosecuted, and have paid the Penalties of Five Pounds for every separate Offence, and One Hundred Pounds for every Week such Practice hath been continued;

His Majesty's Postmaster-General, therefore, give Notice as a Caution to others, that all Persons hereafter detected in collecting or delivering Letters contrary to Law, will be prosecuted; and that the Carriers of Letters unsealed, sewed, or tied up, are equally liable to the said Penalties.
