Naples, March 19.

THE Princes of Tarfia and Raffadal, the Dukes of Turfi, Bruzzano, Andria, Traëtta, and Calabritto, have been appointed Gentlemen of the Bedchamber to his Sicilian Majesty: The Duke of Calabritto is since dead.

One of his Sicilian Majesty's Frigates, and two Xebeques, sailed this Morning towards Sicily, on a Cruize.

Venice, March 22. According to Advices received by the Magistrates of Health from the Proveditor-General in Dalmatia, the latest of which are of the 6th Instant, only two Persons had died of the Plague in that Province in Forty Days, both in the Village of Giassenco in the Territory of Sign.

The Epidemical Distemper among the Horned Cattle in the Neighbourhood of Zara, was almost intirely ceased.

The Plague continued in the Turkish Dominions of Bosnia and Part of Erzegovina, and in the City and Territory of Arta in Epirus.

Prince Czartorinsky, Ambassador from the King of Poland to the Pope, passed through this Place a few Days ago in his Way to Rome.

The Duke d'Aremberg, and a second Son of Prince Nassau Saarbruch-Usingen, a General Officer in the Austrian Service, have been here some Time. The Duke leaves this Place Tomorrow, to pursue his Journey homewards; and the Prince leaves it To-day, to make the Tour of Italy.

Madrid, March 25. His Catholick Majesty, and all the Royal Family, arrived here from the Pardo the 23d Instant.

Turin, March 30. The King of Sardinia has this Week been indisposed with a small Fever, which confined him to his Room for a few Days, but is now perfectly well recovered.

Whereas on Sunday the 24th Day of March last, about Eleven of the Clock at Night, a Gang of Smugglers, to the Number of Twenty or thereabouts, armed with Fire-Arms and other offensive Weapons, were assembled on the North Shore near Poole in the County of Dorset, in order to be aiding and assisting in the Carrying away a large Quantity of Tea. And whereas Lieutenant Edward Down, Commander of the Folk-stone Cutter, in the Service of the Customs, with several of the Men belonging to the same, were, in endeavouring to seize the said Tea, and in preventing the same being rescued from them after Seizure, forcibly and violently obstructed, hindered, and wounded in the Execution and Discharge of their Duty.

The Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs, in order to bring to Justice the said Offenders, do hereby promise a Reward of 50 l. to any Person or Persons who shall discover and apprehend, or cause to be discovered and apprehended, any one or more of the said Offender or Offenders, over and above any Reward given by Act of Parliament; to be paid by the Receiver-General of His Majesty's Customs on Conviction, for each Person so discovered and convicted: And if any of the said Offender or Offenders do and shall, within three Months from the Date hereof, discover to the said Commissioners two or more of his or their Accomplice or Accomplices, and cause them to be apprehended, so that they may be brought to Justice, and convicted of the said Offence, the said Offender or Offenders so discovering shall be acquitted and discharged from such his or their Offence, and receive the like Reward of 50 l. in pursuance of the Act of the 19th of his late Majesty, to be paid by the Receiver-General of His Majesty's Customs upon Conviction.
