Petersbourg, March 12.

OUNT Rzewiski, late Envoy from the Confederation of Poland to this Court, has received his Letters of Credence from the King, appointing him his Minister Plenipotentiary, and had, a few Days ago, his first Audience of her Imperial Majesty in that Character. The Court went Yesterday to Sarskozelo for a Fortnight. M. Prass, who has been Saxon Resident here for many Years, has received his Recall.

Lifton, March 30. The Marquis de Almodovar, his Catholick Majesty's Ambassador to the most Faithful King, arrived here on Tuesday last, and had his first Audience To day to present his Credentials. His Lady is come with with him, and will be presented to the Queen of Portugal To morrow, which is a Gala-Day at Court, being her Majesty's Birth-day.

The Prince of Sanseverino, who is still in a very bad State of Health, having had Leave from his Sicilian Majesty to return Home, will embark for Italy with his Lady in a few Days.

The Fleet for Rio de Janeiro sailed on Wednesday last the 27th Instant, for that Settlement.

Berlin, March 30. The King still continues at Sans Souci. Monday being the Day fixed for the Prussian Troops to begin the Exercises customary before the Grand Review, the Soldiers belonging to the Regiments in Garrison here, return daily from the Provinces where they have been on Furlough ever since last May. The Margravine of Schwedt is dangerously ill at Schwedt.

Berlin, April 2. A few Days ago Prince Frederick of Brunswick arrived here from Potzdam, to exercise and prepare his Regiment for the Grand Review; and Prince William of Brunswick is gone to Konigsberg in the New Marche, where his Regiment is in Garrison. The Queen of Prussia has had no Court these two Days, her Majesty having been indisposed with the Cholick, but is now greatly better.

Copenhagen, April 2. Last Sunday the Prince
Royal of Denmark was confirmed in the Royal

Chapple, in the Presence of their Majesties, the Foreign Ministers, and the whole Court: Previous to the Ceremony, his Royal Highness underwent a very strict Examination on all Points of Religion, in which he excited the Admiration of all present by his thorough Knowledge of the Subject, speaking for two Hours and five Minutes with great Ease and Dignity: The Bishop of Copenhagen officiated on this solemn Occasion; and the whole Ceremony was consucted with all possible Splendor and Decorum.

Hague, April 5. One of the Transports, with Part of the Dutch Troops, so long expected back from Berbices, is arrived in the Texel; in which Ship Colonel de Salve, who commanded the Succours, is returned; the three others, with the Remainder of the Troops, are not yet got in, having been separated in the lace hard Weather at the Entrance of the Channel.

Hague, April 12. Yesterday Morning a Courier arrived here from Lewarden, with an Account that, on the 9th Instant, the Princess Dowager of Orange, Grandmother to the Prince Stadtholder, died there in the 78th Year of her Age.

I IS Majesty having been pleased by His Royal Proclamation of the 22d of February last, to direct, that Passes of a new Fornt shall be issued to all His Subjects trading in the Way of the Cruizers belonging to the Governments on the Coast of Barbary; My Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty do hereby give Notice, that in pursuance of the aforesaid Proclamation, Passes of a new Form will be ready to be issued at this Office from the 1st of May next, to fuch Perfons as shall apply for them, and at His Majesty's Foreign Colonies and Plantations as foon as conveniently may be; but that such Passes of the Old Form as have been iffued, will nevertheless configue in Force till the ist of February 1766.
