Westminster, April 24.

THIS Day His Majesty came to the House of Peers, and being in His Royal Robes seated on the Throne with the usual Solemnity, Sir Septimus Robinson, Knt. Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, was sent with a Message from His Majesty to the House of Commons, commanding their Attendance in the House of Peers. The Commons being come thither accordingly, His Majesty was pleased to give the Royal Assent to,

An Act to confirm all Leases already made by Archbishops and Bishops, and other Ecclesiastical Persons, of Tythes and other Incorporate Hereditaments, for one, two, or three, Life or Lives, or Twenty-one Years; and to enable them to grant such Leases, and to bring Actions of Debt for Recovery of Rents reserved, and in Arrear on Leases for Life or Lives.

An Act for enlarging the Times limited for executing and performing several Provisions, Powers, and Directions, in certain Acts of this Session of Parliament.

After which His Majesty was pleased to make the following most Gracious Speech:

My Lords, and Gentlemen,

THE tender Concern, which I feel for My faithful Subjects, makes Me anxious to provide for every possible Event, which may affect their future Happiness or Security.

My late Indisposition, though not attended with Danger, has led Me to consider the Situation, in which My Kingdoms, and My Family, might be left, if it should please God to put a Period to My Life, whilst My Successor is of tender Years.

The high Importance of this Subject to the Public Safety, good Order, and Tranquility; the Paternal Affection, which I bear to My Children, and to all My People; and My earnest Desire, that every Precaution should be taken, which may tend to preserve the Constitution of Great Britain undisturbed, and the Dignity and Lustre of it's Crown unimpaired; have determined me to lay this weighty Business before My Parliament: And as My Health, by the Blessing of God, is now restored, I take the earliest Opportunity of meeting you here, and of recommending to your most serious Deliberation, the making such Provision, as would be necessary, in case any of My Children should succeed to

the Throne, before they shall respectively attain the Age of Eighteen Years.

To this End, I propose to your Consideration, Whether, under the present Circumstances, it will not be expedient to vest in Me the Power of appointing, from Time to Time, by Instruments in Writing, under My Sign Manual, either the Queen, or any other Person of My Royal Family usually residing in Great Britain, to be the Guardian of the Person of such Successor, and the Regent of these Kingdoms, until such Successor shall attain the Age of Eighteen Years; subject to the like Restrictions and Regulations, as are specified and contained in an Act, passed upon a similar Occasion, in the Twenty-fourth Year of the Reign of the late King, my Royal Grandfather: The Regent so appointed to be assisted by a Council, composed of the several Persons, who, by reason of their Dignities and Offices, are constituted Members of the Council established by that Act, together with those whom you may think proper to leave to My Nomination.

The King has been pleased to grant unto Sir Richard Wrottesley, Bart. Master of Arts, and one of His Majesty's Chaplains in Ordinary, the Deanry of the Cathedral Church of Worcester, void by the Death of Dr. John Waugh, late Dean thereof.

St. James's, April 26.

This Day M. Roussel, Minister from the Bishop of Liege, had his first private Audience of His Majesty, to deliver his Credentials.

To which he was introduced by the Right Honourable the Earl of Sandwich, one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, and conducted by Stephen Cottrell, Esq; Assistant Master of the Ceremonies.

St. James's, April 26, 1765.

Whereas it has been humbly represented to the King, That, on Tuesday the 16th Day of this Instant April, early in the Morning, James Knight, of Walham Green, in the Parish of Fulham, in the County of Middlesex, (being, as is supposed, on his Return Home from London) was found robbed, and barbarously murdered by a Pistol Shot, (which Shot has been since extracted from him) near a House in the Parish of Chelsea, known by the Name, or Sign, of the Cow and Calves, in the High Road between Knightsbridge and Little Chelsea; and that the said Robbery, and barbarous Murder, were committed by some Person or Persons unknown: His Majesty

Majesty, for the better discovering and bringing to Justice the Persons concerned in the said horrid Crimes, is, hereby, pleased to promise His most gracious Pardon to any One of them who shall discover his Accomplice, or Accomplices in the said Facts, (except the Person who actually committed the said Murder) so that he, she, or they, may be apprehended and convicted thereof.
