

Navy-Office, April 29, 1765.

The Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury having issued Money (agreeable to an Act passed the last Sessions of Parliament) for paying a Bounty for the Year 1764. to such Chaplains of His Majesty's Ships as have been actually borne and mustered on their Books, for the Space of Four Years, during the late Wars with France and Spain; These are to give Notice, that the same will begin to be paid at the Pay-Office in Broad-street, on Monday the 20th of May next, to such Persons as are entitled thereto by the said Act.

To prevent the Public being deceived by any Imitation of such Patent Goods, they will be marked on the Forrells PATENT SILK CLOTH; and the Proprietors further to prevent any Imposition, hereby give Notice, that the said Patent-Cloth will be sold in no Part of England but London, where a Warehouse will soon be opened, and proper Notice given in the Papers of the Place and Terms of Sale.

These Goods have the same Appearance of superfine Spanish Broad Cloths; and being of an extraordinary Fineness, Lightness, and Thinness, are better calculated for the general Drefs of the warm Climates Abroad, for Gentlemen's Summer Suits at Home, for Ladies Cloaks and Habits, Clergymen's, Counsellors, and other Robes and the Cloathing of young Gentlemen, than any Kind of Goods hitherto made, and not having the Thickness or Weight of Cloths, nor the Stiffness or Harshness of Stuffs, cannot fail to hang on Children as well as grown People, more negligent and easy than Garments of either of those, or any other Fabricks whatsoever.

AT a General Meeting of the Woolstaplers and Dealers in Wool, held at the Half Moon Tavern in Cheap-side, London, on the 31st of January, 1765; It was unanimously resolved to Prosecute every Person who shall put or wind within any Fleece of Wool, any Clay, Lead, Stones, Sand, Tails, deceitful Locks, Cct Calls, Combre, Lambs Wool, or any other Thing, in order to deceive the Buyer thereof; either in Quality or Weight, contrary to the Laws made in that Behalf; and that the Costs of every such Prosecution should be defrayed out of a Fund then raised for that Intent.

If therefore any Buyer of Wool finds himself aggrieved by any such Deceit, and will send Information thereof in Writing, unto Mr. Hills, Attorney, in East-lane Rotherhithe, London, Clerk to the Company of Merchants of the Staple of England, the same will be forthwith communicated by him to the Committee for the Management of such Prosecutions.
