Lisbon, April 17.

**I**T was not until the 9th Instant that the Hampden Packet arrived, in a Passage of Four and Twenty Days, with the Mail of the 12th of March; and To-day are arrived the King George, Captain Bown, and the Duke of York, Captain Bonnel, both in Seven Days, bringing Three Mails, the last of which is dated the 2d of April.

Their most Faithful Majesties, and the Infante Don Pedro, set out on Tuesday the 9th Instant for Pancas, about two Leagues within the Country on the opposite Side of the Tagus, to take the Diversion of Shooting, and purpose returning about the Beginning of next Month. The Princes of Brazil and the three Infantas do not accompany their Majesties; M. da Cunha has been prevented from attending upon the King upon this Occasion by a severe Indisposition, with which he has been several Days confined, but is now recovering.

Don John de Lancaſter, named Vice-Roy of India, has been created Count de Louzan.

*Dresden, April 26.* The Elector, the Prince Administrator, and the Electress Dowager, set out To-morrow for Leipzig, where they will stay during the Time of the Fair, which lasts a Fortnight, and is expected to prove a very good one. Numbers of Foreign Merchants, particularly Greeks and Poles, who are the best Customers, being arrived there; and the Steuer ERs, which were sometime ago at 62, are now near to 72 and a Half. Prince Charles, the two Princesses, and the rest of the young Electors, shall remain here.
