**T**HE Letters from Cadiz received this Day, mention, that the new British Consul, Mr. Hardy, was very soon expected; and that the Vice-Consul, Mr. Jeffon, died there the 15th of this Month.

*Turin, May 1.* The King of Sardinia, who, on Account of a Defluxion on his Eyes, had been obliged to keep his Room for some Time past, is now able to go out every Day; and her Royal Highness the Dutchess of Savoy, who has been indisposed with a Fever, is in a fair Way of Recovery.

*Berlin, May 4.* Prince Ferdinand of Brun-  
wick arrived at Potzdam two Days ago, from Magdeburg. The King of Prussia has assisted several Times on Horseback at the Exercises of the Troops at Potzdam.

This Day M. Rouffel, Minister from the Bishop of Liege, had his first private Audience of his Royal Highness the Duke of York.

And afterwards of his Royal Highness the Duke of Gloucester, at Leicester House.

If therefore any Buyer of Wool finds himself aggrieved by any such Deceit, and will send Information thereof in Writing, unto Mr. Hills, Attorney, in East-lane Rotherhithe, London, Clerk to the Company of Merchants of the Staple of England, the same will be forthwith communicated by him to the Committee for the Management of such Prosecutions.
