*Extract of a Letter from Major Hector Munro, Commanding in Chief His Majesty's and the East India Company's Troops in Bengal, to the Earl of Sandwich, dated at the Camp at Buxar, the 26th of October 1764, received the 15th Instant.*

**I** HAVE the Pleasure to acquaint your Lordship, that His Majesty's Troops and the India Company's, which I have the Honor to command, have gained a complete Victory over the King and Vizier of Hindoستان, the 23d of this Month. Their Army consisted of 50,000 Men at least. Inclosed I have the Honor to send your Lordship a Return of ours: They had 6000 Men killed on the Field of Battle; and we took 130 Pieces of Cannon from them, besides several Stores of different Kinds. On the 22d I encamped so near the Enemy's Encampment, as to be just out of the Range of their Shot. The Morning of the Action, at Day-light, I went out with some of the principal Officers to reconnoitre their Situation, intending to attack them the following Day; but finding their whole Army under Arms, returned to Camp; ordered in our advanced Posts and Grand Guards; the Drums to beat to Arms; and in less than twenty Minutes after the Line of Battle was formed, having made my Disposition for it the Day before. They began to cannonade us at Nine o'Clock in the Morning, and Half an Hour after, the Action became general: We had a Morass in our Front, which prevented our moving forward for some Time, by which Means the Number of Cannon they had, and which were well levelled, and equally well disposed of, galled us very much. I was forced to order a Battalion of Seapoys, with one Gun, from the Right of the first Line, to move forward to silence one of their Batteries which played upon our Flank; and obliged to support it by another Battalion from the second Line, which had the desired Effect. I then ordered both the Lines to face to the Right, and keep marching, in order to clear the Left Wing of the Morass; and when done, face to our former Front, the Right Wing wheeling up to the Left, to clear a Tope, or small Wood, that was upon our Right; then the first Line moved forward, keeping a very brisk Cannonade. I sent Orders to Major Pemble, who commanded the Second Line, to face it to the Right about, and follow the First; but that Officer saw the Propriety of that Movement so soon, that he began to put it in Execution before he received my Order. Immediately after both Lines pushed forward with so much Ardor and Resolution, at which Time the Small Arms began, that the Enemy soon after began to give way; and Five Minutes before Twelve, their whole Army was put to Flight. Give me Leave, my Lord, to

intreat your Lordship may be pleased to acquaint His Majesty with the gallant and brave Behaviour of the Troops in general: And I beg Leave particularly to recommend Captain Charles Gordon, of the 89th Regiment, my Aid de Camp, for his brave and spirited Behaviour. Your Lordship will excuse me, if, at the same Time, I wish Major Pemble might be recommended to the Chairman and Court of Directors, for his Bravery and good Conduct. Both these Officers had their Horses shot under them in the Action. I do myself the Honour to inclose to your Lordship, a List of our killed, wounded, and missing.

*East-India House, June 15, 1765.*

**T**HE East-India Company, by their Ship *Devonshire* arrived Yesterday off Dover, have received Advices from the President and Council in Bengal, dated the 26th of November last, That the Troops under the Command of Major Munro, having advanced towards the Army commanded by the King Shah Aulum, (late Shah Zadah) and Sujah Dowlah, Nabob of Owde, who waited with their whole Force, and a Number of Artillery, at Buxar, about 100 Miles beyond Patna, the Armies came to a general Engagement on the 23d of October, and the English Troops gained the most compleat Victory possible. The Enemy fled across the Carumnassa with the utmost Precipitation, leaving their whole Camp standing, and about 150 Pieces of Cannon.

Whereas it has been humbly represented to the King, That, in the Night of Saturday the 25th Day of May last, the Pales of the Paddock of the Right Honourable Lord Winterton, at Shillinglee in the County of Sussex, were broke down, and two Braces and a half of fat Bucks killed, and feloniously taken away, and another wounded and left behind: His Majesty, for the better discovering and bringing to Justice the Persons concerned therein, is hereby pleased to promise His most gracious Pardon to any one of them, who shall discover his, her, or their Accomplice or Accomplices, so that he, she, or they may be apprehended and convicted thereof.

And as a farther Encouragement, the said Lord Winterton does hereby promise a Reward of Thirty Guineas to any Person who will make such Discovery either to himself, or to Sir John Fielding, as may be the Means of apprehending one or more of the Offenders, to be paid upon his, her, or their Conviction.

**P**UBLICK Notice is hereby given, That by an Act passed the last Session of Parliament, "For altering certain Rates of Postage, and for amending, explaining, and enlarging several Provisions in the Act of the Ninth of Queen Anne, and other Acts relating to the Post-Office;" It is, amongst other Things, Enacted,

That Letters between London and any Port within the British Dominions in America, (in which all His Majesty's West-India Islands are included) shall pay Single One Shilling, Double Two Shillings, Treble Three Shillings, the Ounce Four Shillings.

That Letters, by Sea, from any one Port to any other Port within the said Dominions, shall pay Single Four Pence, Double Eight Pence, Treble One Shilling, the Ounce One Shilling and Four Pence.

That Letters, by Land, to or from any Chief Post-Office in America, from or to any other Part thereof not exceeding Sixty Miles from such Chief Post Office, or from the Office where such Letters, not passing through a Chief Office, may be put in, shall pay Single Four Pence, Double Eight Pence, Treble One Shilling, the Ounce One Shilling and Four Pence. And being upwards of Sixty, and not exceeding One Hundred Miles within the said Dominions, shall pay Single Six Pence, Double One Shilling, Treble One Shilling and Six Pence, the Ounce Two Shillings. And being upwards of One Hundred, and not exceeding

ceeding Two Hundred Miles within the said Dominions, shall pay Single Eight Pence, Double One Shilling and Four Pence, Treble Two Shillings, the Ounce Two Shillings and Eight Pence. And for every Distance not exceeding One Hundred Miles above such Two Hundred, and for every such further Distance within the said Dominions, shall pay Single Two Pence, Double Four Pence, Treble Six Pence, the Ounce Eight Pence.

That no Vessel shall be permitted to break Bulk, or make Entry in any Port within the *British* Dominions, where Posts are or may be established, until all Letters on board are delivered to the Postmaster of such Port (he paying the Bringer One Penny for each Letter) to be forwarded according to their respective Directions, except such as are excepted by the Act of the Ninth of *Queen Anne*; and such as may be brought by Vessels liable to Quarentine, which last are to be delivered to the Persons superintending the Quarentine, for proper Care, before they are forwarded by the Post. And that all Masters, Mariners, Passengers, &c. neglecting to deliver the Letters as aforesaid, shall, for every Neglect, forfeit Twenty Pounds.

That the Postmaster shall take for every Letter brought by such Vessel, for any Place within his Delivery, One Penny, above the Penny paid to the Master or other Person for the same.

That Letters conveyed in *Great Britain* and *Ireland*, not exceeding one Stage, shall pay Single One Penny, Double Two Pence, Treble Three Pence, the Ounce Four Pence. And in *England*, above one and not exceeding two Stages, Single Two Pence, Double Four Pence, Treble Six Pence, the Ounce Eight Pence; but these Rates are not to affect the Penny-Post.

That Letters passing between *England* and *Ireland*, through *Carlisle*, *Dumfries*, *Port Patrick*, and *Donagadee*, shall pay the same Rates of *English*, *Scotch*, *Irish*, and Packet Postage, according to the Distance or Number of Stages they are conveyed in each Kingdom, as are settled by the Act of the Ninth of *Queen Anne*, or by this Act.

That no Packet exceeding the Weight of Four Ounces shall be sent by the Penny-Post; unless coming from, or passing thereby to the General-Post.

That Letters passing between *London* and *Hamburg* shall pay as Letters between *London* and all other Parts of *Germany*, viz. Single One Shilling, Double Two Shillings, Treble Three Shillings, the Ounce Four Shillings.

That any Officer of the Post-Office secreting or destroying any Letter, Bag or Mail of Letters, containing any Bank Note, Bill, or other Paper, Writing, or Order for the Payment of Money; or stealing out of any Letter any such Bank Note, Bill, &c. on Conviction, shall suffer Death as a Felon.

That any Person robbing a Mail, in any Place or in any Manner whatsoever, although it may not appear that any one was put in Fear by such Robbery shall, on Conviction, suffer Death as a Felon.

That any Officer of the Post-Office, entrusted to take in Letters, and receive the Postage thereof, embezzling the Money received, or destroying the Letters; or any Officer advancing the Rates on Letters, and not accounting for the advanced Postage, shall, on Conviction, be deemed guilty of Felony.

That any Post-Boy having a Mail or Bag of Letters under his Care, deserting the same before his Arrival at the next Stage; or suffering any other, Person to ride on the Horse or Carriage along therewith; or loitering on the Road; or not, in all possible Cases, conveying the Mail after the Rate of Six measured Miles an Hour, shall, on Conviction, before one Justice of the Peace, be sent to the House of Correction for any Time not exceeding One Month, nor less than Fourteen Days.

That any Post-Boy, singly, or in Combination with others, unlawfully collecting, or conveying Letters, or causing the same to be unlawfully conveyed, shall, on Conviction, before one Justice of the Peace, forfeit Ten Shillings, to be paid to the Informer, for every Letter so unlawfully collected,

conveyed, or delivered. And if the Forfeiture is not immediately paid, shall be sent to the House of Correction, for any Time not exceeding Two Months, nor less than One Month.

That all Rates of Letters, and all Forfeitures, mentioned in this Act, shall be paid in Sterling Money of *Great Britain*.

The Rates established by this Act for the Port of Letters between *London* and *Hamburg*; and the Limitation of the Weight of Packets to be sent by the Penny-Post, commence from the Fifth of July next. All other Regulations, Rates of Postage, Fines, Penalties, and Forfeitures beforementioned, commence from the Tenth Day of October next.
