A PROCLAMATION.

GEORGE R.

WHEREAS by an Act made in the last Session of Parliament, intituled, "An Act for repealing the Act made in the last Session of Parliament, intituled, An Act for vesting the Fort of Senegal, and its Dependencies, in the Company of Merchants trading to Africa; and to vest as well the said Fort and its Dependencies, as all other the British Forts and Settlements upon the Coast of Africa, lying between the Port of Sallee and Cape Rouge, together with all the Property, Estate, and Effects of the Company of Merchants trading to Africa, in or upon the said Forts, Settlements, and their Dependencies, in His Majesty; and for securing, extending, and improving the Trade to Africa;" it is, amongst other Things, enacted, That from and after the Twenty-fourth Day of June, One thousand seven hundred and sixty-five, the said Company of Merchants trading to Africa shall be, and they are, thereby, absolutely divested of all and every the Forts, Lands, Castles, Settlements, and Factories, on the Coast of Africa, beginning at the Port of Sallee in South Barbary, and extending from thence to Cape Rouge, inclusive; and all other the Regions, Countries, Dominions, Territories, Continents, Coasts, Ports, Bays, Rivers, and Places, lying and being within the aforesaid Limits, and the Islands near adjoining to those Coasts, and comprehended within the said Limits; and all other the Property, Estate, and Effects whatsoever, which, by virtue of the Acts severally made in the Twenty-third and Twenty-fifth Years of his late Majesty, or either of them, are now vested in the said Company of Merchants trading to Africa: And that, from and after the said Twenty-fourth Day of June, as well the said Fort of Senegal, and its Dependencies, as all other the Forts, Lands, Castles, Settlements, and Factories, on the Coast of Africa, beginning at the Port of Sallee in South Barbary, and extending from thence to Cape Rouge, inclusive; and all other the Property, Estate and Effects whatsoever, possessed by the said Company of Merchants within the Limits aforesaid, or claimed by them in respect to such their Possessions within the said Limits, be, and they are, thereby, fully and absolutely vested in Us, Our Heirs and Successors: Now We, being desirous of making

Provision for the present Government of the said Forts, Lands, Castles, Settlements, Factories, and Places before mentioned, and securing the Peace and good Order thereof, until We shall establish such other Form and Order of Government therein as to Us, in Our Royal Wisdom, shall seem most for the Honour of Our State, and the Happiness of Our Subjects there, have thought fit, by and with the Advice of Our Privy Council, to issue this Our Royal Proclamation; and do hereby order, signify, and declare Our Pleasure, That all Persons who now are, or, at the Time of the Publication of this Proclamation, shall be, lawfully possessed of, or invested in, any Offices or Places of Authority, Government, or Employment, Civil or Military, in the said Forts, Lands, Castles, Settlements, Factories, and Places; and particularly all Governors, Lieutenants, or Deputy Governors, President and Assistants, Councils, and all others, in any Place or Rank of Government, or concerned in the Administration of Government, either inferior or superior, and all other Officers and Ministers holding any Office, Place, or Employment there, under the Authority of the Committee of the said Company of Merchants trading to Africa, shall hold under Us, and be continued in their said several and respective Places, Offices, or Employments, and enjoy the same with the like Salaries, Fees, Perquisites, and Emoluments thereto belonging, which have hitherto been actually paid, until Our Pleasure be further known, or other Provision be made for the due Government and Ordering of the said Forts, Lands, Castles, Settlements, Factories, and Places: And that, in the mean Time, for the Preservation of the publick Peace, good Order, and Tranquillity of the same, We do strictly command all the said Persons, of whatsoever Rank, Degree, or Condition, to proceed in the Execution of their respective Offices, and to perform all the Duties thereunto belonging: And further, We do hereby will and command all and singular Our Subjects in the said Forts, Lands, Castles, Settlements, Factories, and Places, of what Estate or Degree they, or any of them, be, to be obedient to, and aiding, helping, and assisting, the said Officers and Ministers in the Performance and Execution of their said Offices, Places, and Employments, as they tender Our Displeasure, and will answer the contrary at their utmost Perils. All which Matters and Things herein before commanded and directed, We do, by this Our Proclamation, order and direct to be done, performed, submitted

submitted to, and obeyed, until We shall further make known Our Royal Will and Pleasure thereupon.

GOD save the KING.

Vienna, June 15. It is said that the Journey to *Inspruck* remains fixed for the 3d of next Month. Count and Countess *Thurn*, and the Ladies of the Court, and *Chambellans*, that are to receive the *Infanta* at *Genoa*, set out Yesterday. Count *Thurn* is charged with a great Number of magnificent Presents, to be distributed to the principal Persons of the Court of Spain that attend the *Infanta*, the chief Officers of the Fleet that escorts her, and such of the *Genoese Nobility* as are appointed by the Republic to receive her, and do the Honors of *Genoa*.

The Queen of the Romans is now perfectly recovered.

The Emperor is gone to pass a few Days at *Holitsch*.

Hague, June 28. By Letters received from *Loos*, we learn that his Royal Highness the Duke of *York* had had an Interview with the Prince of *Orange*, and after Dinner was conducted to *Deventer* by Prince *Lewis* of *Brunswick*, in the Prince of *Orange's* Equipages, and escorted by his Guards; and that all military Honours had been paid to him in that Town: That his Royal Highness rested some Hours at *Delden* on Tuesday Night; and intended to reach *Osna-brug* on Wednesday Night.

The King has been pleased to order like Letters, for the Promotion of *Charles Dodgson*, Doctor in Divinity, to the Bishoprick of *Offory*, void by the Translation of Doctor *Richard Pococke*, late Bishop thereof, to the Bishoprick of *Meath*.

General Post-Office, June 8, 1765.

PUBLICK Notice is hereby given, That by an Act passed the last Session of Parliament, "For altering certain Rates of Postage, and for amending, explaining, and enlarging several Provisions in the Act of the Ninth of Queen Anne, and other Acts relating to the Post-Office;" It is, amongst other Things, Enacted,

That Letters between *London* and any Port within the *British Dominions in America*, (in which all His Majesty's *West-India* Islands are included) shall pay Single One Shilling, Double Two Shillings, Treble Three Shillings, the Ounce Four Shillings.

That Letters, by Sea, from any one Port to any other Port within the said Dominions, shall pay Sin-

gle Four Pence, Double Eight Pence, Treble One Shilling, the Ounce One Shilling and Four Pence.

That Letters, by Land, to or from any Chief Post-Office in *Africa*, from or to any other Part thereof; not exceeding Sixty Miles from such Chief Post-Office; or from the Office where such Letters, not passing through a Chief Office, may be put in, shall pay Single Four Pence, Double Eight Pence, Treble One Shilling, the Ounce One Shilling and Four Pence. And being upwards of Sixty, and not exceeding One Hundred Miles within the said Dominions, shall pay Single Six Pence, Double One Shilling, Treble One Shilling and Six Pence, the Ounce Two Shillings. And being upwards of One Hundred, and not exceeding Two Hundred Miles within the said Dominions, shall pay Single Eight Pence, Double One Shilling and Four Pence, Treble Two Shillings, the Ounce Two Shillings and Eight Pence. And for every Distance not exceeding One Hundred Miles above such Two Hundred, and for every such further Distance within the said Dominions, shall pay Single Two Pence, Double Four Pence, Treble Six Pence, the Ounce Eight Pence.

That no Vessel shall be permitted to break Bulk, or make Entry in any Port within the *British* Dominions, where Posts are or may be established, until all Letters on board are delivered to the Postmaster of such Port (he paying the Bringer One Penny for each Letter) to be forwarded according to their respective Directions, except such as are excepted by the Act of the Ninth of Queen Anne; and such as may be brought by Vessels liable to Quarentine, which last are to be delivered to the Persons superintending the Quarentine, for proper Care, before they are forwarded by the Post. And that all Masters, Mariners, Passengers, &c. neglecting to deliver the Letters as aforesaid, shall, for every Neglect, forfeit Twenty Pounds.

That the Postmaster shall take for every Letter brought by such Vessel, for any Place within his Delivery, One Penny, above the Penny paid to the Master or other Person for the same.

That Letters conveyed in *Great Britain* and *Ireland*, not exceeding one Stage, shall pay Single One Penny, Double Two Pence, Treble Three Pence, the Ounce Four Pence. And in *England*, above one and not exceeding two Stages, Single Two Pence, Double Four Pence, Treble Six Pence, the Ounce Eight Pence; but these Rates are not to affect the Penny-Post.

That Letters passing between *England* and *Ireland*, through *Carlisle*, *Dumfries*, *Port Patrick*, and *Donaghadee*, shall pay the same Rates of *English*, *Scotch*, *Irish*, and Packet Postage, according to the Distance or Number of Stages they are conveyed in each Kingdom, as are settled by the Act of the Ninth of Queen Anne, or by this Act.

That no Packet exceeding the Weight of Four Ounces shall be sent by the Penny-Post; unless coming from, or passing thereby to the General Post.

That Letters passing between *London* and *Hamburg* shall pay as Letters between *London* and all other Parts of *Germany*, viz. Single One Shilling, Double Two Shillings, Treble Three Shillings, the Ounce Four Shillings.

That any Officer of the Post-Office secreting or destroying any Letter, Bag or Mail of Letters, containing any Bank Note, Bill, or other Paper, Writing, or Order for the Payment of Money; or stealing out of any Letter any such Bank Note, Bill, &c. on Conviction, shall suffer Death as a Felon.

That any Person robbing a Mail, in any Place or in any Manner whatsoever, although it may not appear

pear that any one was put in Fear by such Robbery, shall, on Conviction, suffer Death as a Felon.

That any Officer of the Post-Office, entrusted to take in Letters, and receive the Postage thereof, embezzling the Money received, or destroying the Letters, or any Officer advancing the Rates on Letters, and not waiting for the advanced Postage, shall, on Conviction, be deemed guilty of Felony.

That any Post-Boy having a Mail or Bag of Letters under his Care, deserting the same before his Arrival at the next Stage; or suffering any other Person to ride on the Horse or Carriage along therewith; or loitering on the Road; or not, in all possible Cases, conveying the Mail after the Rate of Six measured Miles an Hour, shall, on Conviction, before one Justice of the Peace, be sent to the House of Correction for any Time not exceeding One Month, nor less than Fourteen Days.

That any Post-Boy, singly, or in Combination with others, unlawfully collecting, or conveying Letters, or causing the same to be unlawfully conveyed, shall, on Conviction, before one Justice of the Peace, forfeit Ten Shillings, to be paid to the Informer, for every Letter so unlawfully collected, conveyed, or delivered. And if the Forfeiture is not immediately paid, shall be sent to the House of Correction, for any Time not exceeding Two Months, nor less than One Month.

That all Rates of Letters, and all Forfeitures, mentioned in this Act, shall be paid in Sterling Money of Great Britain.

The Rates established by this Act for the Port of Letters between London and Hamburgh; and the Limitation of the Weight of Packets to be sent by the Penny-Post, commence from the Fifth of July next. All other Regulations, Rates of Postage, Pains, Penalties, and Forfeitures beforementioned, commence from the Tenth Day of October next.
