The KING's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

THIS Day the Right Honourable William Earl of Dartmouth, Richard Viscount Howe, and George Lord Edgumbe, were, by His Majesty's Command, sworn of His Majesty's most Honourable Privy Council, and took their respective Places at the Board accordingly.

Vienna, July 6. His Highness Prince Charles of Mecklenburgh arrived here on Saturday, and was introduced the next Day to their Imperial Majesties, and the rest of the Royal Family, by his Uncle Prince of Saxe Hilbourghaufen.

The Emperor and Empress, the King of the Romans, the Archduke Leopold, and the two eldest Archduchesses, set out for Inspruck on Thursday Morning, after having assisted at High Mass, that was celebrated with great Pomp in the Cathedral of this City: They proposed reaching Gratz that Night, and intended remaining there three Days.

Genoa, July 6. On the 3d Instant, in the Evening, the Princess of Parma made her Entry into this City with a very numerous Suite, and escorted by a Company of the Duke of Parma's Horse Guards. As soon as the Princess passed the first Gate of the Suburbs, she was saluted by 101 Pieces of Cannon; and when appeared in Sight of the Port, His Majesty's Ship the Centurion, Commodore Harrison, and the Guadaloupe, the Honourable Captain Ruthven, saluted, each, with Twenty-one Guns. The same Evening the Princess received the Republick's Deputation of Six Gentlemen and Six Ladies; and the next Day she was complimented by almost all the Nobility of both Sexes. The Princess took an Airing on the Sea Yesterday Evening, with two of the Republick's Gallies; and, on passing by His Majesty's Ships Centurion and Guadaloupe, was saluted with Twenty-one Guns from each Ship.

Venice, July 10. Cavalier Tron is returned from the Confines, and has gained great Applause from the Senate for his Conduct, in the settling of the Dispute about the Waters of the Tartaro, and has reassumed his Office of Savio Grande.

The Imperial Ambassador goes to Mantua with a great Train, to meet the Archduke and the Infanta of Spain.

Berlin, July 13. On the 10th Instant the Court of Brunswick, together with his Royal Highness the Duke of York, arrived at Potsdam, and were most graciously received by his Prussian Majesty. Last Night the Duke of

York came to Berlin from Potzdam in perfect Health and Spirits, and his Royal Highness is highly pleased with the kind and most distinguished Reception he has met with from the King of Prussia. This Morning his Royal Highness set out in one of his Prussian Majesty's Equipages for Charlottenbourg, where that Monarch is arrived with the Court of Brunswick. To-morrow is the Day appointed for the Marriage of the Prince Royal of Prussia with the Princess Elizabeth of Brunswick.

His Serene Highness the Reigning Prince of Anhalt Dessau arrived here on the 11th Instant; and it is said that the Ceremony of Betrothing that Prince with her Royal Highness the Princess Louisa-Henrietta-Wilhelmina, youngest Daughter to Margrave Henry, the King of Prussia's Cousin, will, this Evening, be performed at Charlottenbourg.
