The KING's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

**H**IS Majesty in Council was this Day pleased to declare the Right Honourable Francis Earl of Hertford, Lieutenant General, and General Governor of His Majesty's Kingdom of Ireland.

Turin, July 20. A most melancholy as well as unexpected Accident has put this Court into the greatest Concern: The Infant Duke of Parma, who had been taken ill of the Small-Pox at Alexandria, and appeared to be in a fair Way of doing well at the Beginning, grew suddenly worse towards the Eighth Day of his Illness, and expired on Thursday Morning the 18th of this Month. The King of Sardinia has shewn the most sincere Affliction for his Death. The Dutchess of Savoy, having never had the Small-Pox, was obliged, as well as the Duke, to abstain from seeing the Infant her Brother, as soon as the Nature of the Malady was declared; and last Night both their Royal Highnesses returned to this Capital, full of real and unspeakable Grief, which every Circumstance tended to aggravate. The King of Sardinia immediately dispatched Messengers to the Courts of Vienna, Versailles, and Madrid, to apprise them with this unfortunate Event.

The Spanish Fleet that brought the Arch-dutchess to Genoa, came into that Port Wednesday the 17th Instant; and her Royal Highness will probably set out from thence the 21st or 22d, to continue on her Way to Inspruck.

Surry and Suffex Turnpikes.
