*Florence, July 13.*

**L**AST Week the Prince of Stigliano passed by here on his Way to Genoa. He is charged with a Present of Jewels that the King of Naples sends to his Sister. The Constable Colonna, after having performed, as usual, the Ceremony on St. Peter's Day of presenting to the Pope the Tribute for the Kingdom of Naples, left Rome, and passed here likewise for Genoa, whither many are gone from hence.

*Venice, July 17.* The Senate has refused to put the Bishop of Sebenico in Possession of the Temporalities of his Bishoprick, because the Pope chose another Bishop, instead of one of the three whom the Senate had nominated, as usual, for that See.

*Genoa, July 20.* On the 17th Instant, in the Afternoon, the Spanish Squadron arrived in this Port, in Twenty-three Days, from Carthagena, consisting of One Ship of Eighty Guns, Eight Ships of Seventy Guns each, Two-Sambuchines of Twenty-eight and Thirty-two Guns, Two Tartans, and Two Transport Polaccas, commanded in Chief by Marquis del Vitoria Don John Joseph Navarro, who carried the Royal Spanish Standard at the Maintop Gallant Mast Head; the Second Commander in Chief is Rear Admiral Don Blas de la Barreda. Upon the Spanish Squadron's Approach near the Port, it was saluted by His Majesty's Ships Centurion and Guadaloupe, with Twenty-one Guns each; the Centurion having been dressed, let fly all the Colours; and as soon as the Spanish Admiral came into Port, the Princess Louisa-Mary was saluted from the City with 101 Guns. The next Morning the Princess came ashore in Admiral Navarro's Barge, saluted by all the Ships of the Spanish Squadron Three Times with Twenty-one Guns from each Ship. The Princess went immediately to the Palace where the Princess of Parma was lodged; and, after the mutual Compliments, both Princesses went to the Palace that had been prepared by the Republic, followed by all the Gentlemen and Ladies of the Courts of Vienna, Madrid and Parma, and the Ambassadors and Ministers of the Courts of Spain, France and Naples. The Notarial Acts being read and exchanged, the Infanta from Spain was delivered into the Custody of the Ladies sent by the Court of Vienna to receive and accompany that Princess to Inspruck; and the Infanta of Parma was, by the Ladies of that Court, delivered into the Care of those appointed by the Court of Spain to receive and conduct that Princess to Madrid. The same Afternoon the Infanta Arch-Duchess received the Compliments of the Republic's Deputation of Gentlemen and Ladies; and in the Evening both the Princesses went to the Theatre, where they staid to see only the first Act of the Opera.

Yesterday Morning all the Nobility paid their Compliments to the Infanta from Spain. A few Hours before, a Courier came from Alexandria,

and brought the News, that the Duke of Parma died in that City the 18th Instant, at Seven o'Clock at Night, after a short Illness of Five Days: It has plunged the young Princess his Daughter into the deepest Sorrow, and all the Ladies, &c. attached to her Person, are going into Mourning; the Public Diversions, intended for the Amusement of the Two Princesses during their Stay here, are stopped, and it is believed will be entirely laid aside. The Arch-Duchess is to begin the Journey for Inspruck the 23d Instant.

*Berlin, July 27.* Last Wednesday the Queen of Prussia gave, at Schonhausen, her Summer Palace, a grand Supper and Ball, at which the Reigning Duke, his Brother Prince Ferdinand, and the Hereditary Prince of Brunswick, assisted. The next Day, after taking Leave of her Prussian Majesty, and the rest of the Royal Family here, they set out for Brunswick. Two Days ago the Dutchess of Brunswick left Potsdam, in order to pay a Visit at Schwedt to the Margravine her Sister; from thence she is to return to Brunswick. Her Royal Highness the Hereditary Princess is also set out with her Retinue for Brunswick.

His Royal Highness the Duke of York having expressed a Desire of seeing some of the Prussian Troops exercise, the King of Prussia was pleased to order seven Battalions of Infantry, Part of the Troops which compose a Garrison, to be exercised in the Thier Garden before his Royal Highness, who expressed the greatest Satisfaction at the different Evolutions they performed, and the fine Appearance they made.

The King has been pleased to constitute and appoint the Right Honourable Charles Earl Cornwallis to be one of His Majesty's Aids du Camp, and to take Rank as Colonel of Foot.
