Lifbon, July 22. HE British King, an East India Ship, Captain Peter Pigou, arrived here the 14th Inftant from China; fhe was obliged to put into this Port for a new Main-maft.

Venice, July 26. The King of the Romans arrived on Wednefday laft at the Houfe of Count Betoni, on the Lake of Garda. Upon Notice given to this Republick of the King's Arrival, Orders were fent to the Podeftas of Bre cia and Salò to attend, and shew his Majefty all poffible Marks of Respect, and to contribute as much as possible to his Amusement during his Stay there.

Last Week the Duke of Chablais passed through the Venetian State in his Way to Infpruck. His Royal Highness was entertained by the Governors of Bergamo and Brefcia with all the Honours due to his Birth and Dignity,

and was efforted by a Party of Horfe. Barcelona, July 27. This City is now ho-noured with the Prefence of the youngest Prince of the Houfe of Mecklenburg Strelitz, who arrived here the 24th Inftant; and though his Highness travels under the Name of Count Stargardt, yet all the Governors in this Part of Spain have Orders from Court to receive him with the utmost Distinction. His Highnels proposes to set out for France in two or three Days.

Florence, July 27. A Tripoline Ambaffador arrived here a few Days ago, and had an Au-dience of Marshal Botta with some Ceremony. His Family is numerous. He has brought with him 20 Barbary Horfes, and fome Wild Beafts, as a Prefent for the Emperor.

DUBLICK Notice is hereby given, Thut by an Act passed the last Session of Parliamest, For altering certain Rates of Postage, and for " amending, explaining, and enlarging feveral "ro-" visions in the Act of the Ninth of Queen Anne, " and other Acts relating to the Post-Office;" It is, amongst other Things, Enacted,

That Letters between London and any Port within the British Dominions in America, (in which all His Majefty's West-India Islands are included) that pay Single One Shilling, Double Two Shillings, Treble

Three Shillings, the Oance Four Shillings. That Letters, by Sea, from any one Port to any other Port within the faid Dominions, shall pay Single Four Pence, Double Eight Pence, Treble One Shilling, the Ounce One Shilling and Four Pence. That Letters, by Land, to or from any Chief Polt-

Office in America, from or to any other Part thereof not exceeding Sixty Miles from fuch Chief Post Office, or from the Office where fuch Letters, not palling through a Chief Office, may be put in, shall pay Single Four Pence, Double Eight Pence, Treble One Shilling, the Ounce One Shilling and Four Pence. And being upwards of Sixty, and not exceeding One Hundred Miles within the faid Dominions, shall pay Single Six Pence, Double One Shilling, Treble One Shilling and Six Pence, the Ounce Two Shillings. And being upwards of One Hundred, and not ex-ceeding Two Hundred Miles within the faid Dominions, shall pay Single Eight Pence, Double One Shilling and Four Pence, Treble Two Shillings, the Ounce Two Shillings and Eight Peace. And for every Diffance not exceeding One Hundred Miles above fuch Two Hundred, and for every fu h further Diftance within the faid Dominions, fhall pay Single Two Pence, Double Four Pence, Treble Six Pence, the Ounce Eight Pence.

That no Veffel shall be permitted to break Bilk, or make Entry in any Port within the Britif Domi-nions, where Pofts are or may be established. until all Letters on board are delivered to the Poftmaster of fuch Port (he paying the Bringer One Penny for each Letter) to be forwarded according to their respective Directions, except fuch as are excepted by the Act of the Ninth of Queen Anne; and fuch as may be brought by Veffels liable to Quarentine, which laft are to be delivered to the Perfons superintending the Quarentine, for proper Care, before they are for-warded by the Polt. And that all Masters, Mariners, Paffengers, &c. reglecting to deliver the Lette s as aforefaid, fhall, for every Neglect, forfeit Twenty Pounds.

That the Poflmaster shall take for every Letter brought by such Vessel, for any Place within his Delivery, One Penny, above the Penny paid to the Master or other Person for the same.

That Letters conveyed in Great Britain and Ireland, not exceeding one Stage, Ihall pay Single One Penny, Double Two Pence, Treble Three Pence, the Ounce Four Pence. And in England, above one and not exceeding two Stages, Single Two Pence, Double Four Pence, Treble Six Pence, the Ounce Eight Pence; but these Rates are not to affect the Penny-Poft.

That Letters paffing between England and Ireland, through Garlifle, Dumfries, Port Patrick, and Donagbadee, fhall pay the fame Rates of English, Scotch, Irish, and Packet Poltage, according to the Distance or Number of Stages they are conveyed in each Kingdom, as are fettled by the Act of the Ninth of Queen Anne, or by this Act.

That no Packet exceeding the Weight of Four Ounces shall be fent by the Penny Post; unless coming from, or passing thereby to the General Post. That Letters passing between London and Ham-

That Letters paffing between London and Hamburgb fhall pay as Letters between London and all other Parts of Germany, viz. Single One Shilling, Double Two Shillings, Treble Three Shillings, the Oance Four Shillings.

That any Officer of the Poft-Office fecreting or deftroying any Letter, Bag or Mail of Letters, containing any Bank Note, Bill, or other Paper, Wri ing, or Order for the Payment of Money; or flealing out of any Letter any fuch Bank Note. Bill, &c. on Conviction, fhall fuffer Death as a Felon.

That any Perfon robbing a Mail, in any Place or in any Manner whatfoever, although it may not appear that any one was put in Fear by fuch Robbery, ihall, on Conviction, fuffer Death as a Felon.

That any Officer of the Polt Office, entrulted to take in Letters, and receive the Poltage thereof, embezzling the Money received, or deftroying the Letters; or any Officer advancing the Rates on Letters, and not accounting for the advanced Poltage, fhall, on Conviction, be deemed guilty of Felony.

That any Polt-Boy having a Mail or Bag of Letters under his Care, deferting the fame before his Arrival at the next Stage; or fuffering any other, Perfon to ride on the Horfe or Carriage along therewith; or loitering on the Road; or not, in all poffible Cafes, conveying the Mail after the Rate of Six meafured Miles an Hour, fhall, on Conviction, before one Juffice of the Peace, be fent to the Houfe of Correction for any Time not exceeding One Month, nor lefs than Fourteen Days.

That any Poft-Boy, fingly, or in Combination with others, unlawfully collecting, or conveying Letters, or caufing the fame to be unlawfully conveyed, fhall, on Conviction, before one Juffice of the Peace, forfeit Ten Shillings, to be paid to the Informer, for every Letter fo unlawfully collected, conveyed, or delivered. And if the Forfeiture is not immediately paid, fhall be fent to the Houfe of Correction, for any Time not exceeding Two Months, nor lefs than One Month.

That all Rates of Letters, and all Forfeitures, mentioned in this A&, shall be paid in Sterling Money of Great Britain.

The Rates established by this Act for the Port of Letters between London and Hamburgh; and the Limitation of the Weight of Packets to be fent by the Penny-Post, commence from the Fifth of July next. All other Regulations, Rates of Postage, Pains, Penalties, and Forfeitures beforementioned, com mence from the Tenth Day of October next.
