The Queen's Palace, St. James's Park, August 21, 1765.

o'Clock, the Queen was happily delivered of a Prince. Her Royal Highness the Princess Dowager of Wales, several Lords of His Majesty's most Honourable Privy Council, and the Ladies of Her Majesty's Bed-Chamber, were present.

This great Event was made known by the Firing of the Tower Guns. Her Majesty is, God be praised, as well as can be expected; and the young Prince

is in perfect Health.

Genoa, July 27. On the 23d the Infanta Archdutchess began her Journey towards Inspruck, and departed from this City at Seven o'Clock in the Morning, accompanied by all the Gentlemen and Ladies who were fent hither by the Court of Vienna to receive her Royal Highness: As foon as the Princels was near the Gates of the City she was faluted with 101 Guns. On the 24th Instant in the Afternoon the Princess of Parma embarked in Admiral Navarro's Barge, which was steered by the Admiral, and was followed by all the Barges and Boats belonging to the Spanish Squadron, and by all the Boats of the Town, which were filled with People whose Curiofity led them to be Spectators of the Cere-As foon as the Prinmonies on this Occasion. cess was got into the Barge she was saluted with 101 Guns fired from the Walls of the City; and upon the Appearance of the Barge in Sight of His Britannick Majesty's Ships Centurion, Thames, Guadaloupe, and Vulture Sloop, the Princess was faluted with 21 Guns from each; and the Centurion being dreft immediately after-wards let fly all the Colours. As foon as the Princess was on Board the Admiral's Ship she was faluted with a triple Discharge of 21 Guns from all the Ships of the Spanish Squadron. Early the 25th Instant the Fleet got under Sail, but they were all in Sight Yesterday Afternoon.

The two Princesses have made very considerable Presents of Diamond Rings, Aigrettes, Gold Watches set with Brilliants, and Pictures set with Diamonds, to all the Gentlemen and Ladies who were deputed by the Republick to attend them during their Stay, as likewise to the respective Consuls and Vice-Consuls; and in general to all those who had the Honour to be employed in affishing on Occasion of their Stay in the City: The Presents are valued, at least, at Thirty Thousand Pounds Sterling.

Florence, August 3. An Edict was published here a few Days ago, to lessen the current Va-

lue of Species of Roman Silver Coins called Testoons and Pauls, that were coined before the Year 1700, which, by Time, are become deficient. The Currency of them is not prohibited, but the Value reduced Seven and an Half per Cent. Some Months ago all the Roman Half Pauls in general, and some other Coins of particular Popes since the Year 1740, were reduced Five per Cent. which, joined to this, makes a Deduction of Twelve and an Half per Cent. on above three Parts of the small Silver Coin that is current in this Country.

A confiderable Part of the Baggage belonging to the Archdutches, that was brought from Spain, is arrived here from Genoa; and the greatest Expedition is used to get every Thing ready for the Arrival of the Archduke, which, it is thought, may be anticipated by the Death of the Duke of Parma, as that Event may interrupt the Festivals that were prepared at In-

fpruck.

Venice, August 9. On the 29th past, the Infanta of Spain was met and complimented, in the Name of this Republick, by Signor Marco Zen, Podesta and Capitanio of Verona, attended with a great Retinue, upon her Arrival on the Fontiers of the Veronele State from Mantua. His Excellency then left the Infanta to pursue her Journey in the Venetian State, and went to Castelnuovo, to wait her Royal Highness's Arrival, where she was pleased to go into a Palace prepared for her Reception, and to partake of a magnificent Entertainment provided for her Royal Highness and all her Court. There were many noble Venetians of both Sexes, and many of the Nobility of the Country, to pay their Court to the Infanta; who, after staying several Hours, and expressing much Satisfaction with her Reception, was attended by Signor Zen to the Frontiers of the Venetian State: from whence her Royal Highness proceeded on her Journey to Inspruck. She was attended through this State by a Party of Horse; and a Bridge was laid over the Adige for her Royal Highness, that she might avoid the difficult Pasfage of the Chiusa. A great Number of Posthorses were provided; and the whole Expences were defrayed by this Government, which amounted, they fay, to about 60,000 Ducats, The Infanta is exabove 8,000 l. Sterling. pected to return with the Archduke the 15th of September, and to pass through Verona.
