G O D Save the K I N G .

Naples, August 6. A few Days ago this Court went into Mourning for the Duke of Parma, which is to last four Months.

Lisbon, August 10. On Tuesday the 6th Instant the Court received the disagreeable News of the Death of the Infant Don Philip Duke of Parma and Placentia, Brother to the Queen of Portugal. Their most Faithful Majesties, according to the customary Stile upon these Occasions, shut themselves up for eight Days; during which Time all publick Diversions are suspended; and the Court has put on Mourning for four Months.

St. Idephonso, August 12. His Catholick Majesty, the Queen Mother, and all this Royal Family, came here last Tuesday the 8th, and will wait here the Arrival of the Princess of Parma.

Florence, August 20. Many Families daily arrive here from Germany belonging to the Court:

Court: It is supposed, that they will in all amount to Four Hundred Families: And as the Time for the Arrival of the Archduke approaches, every Disposition is carrying on with the utmost Diligence; Marshal Botta has sent a Circular Letter to all the Great Officers, and to the Ladies who are appointed, to prepare to go to Bologna to wait for the Archduke and Dutchess, where they are to enter upon Duty immediately: Marshal Botta likewise goes there. The Family of Caprara, where the Prince and Princess are to lodge, are making the most magnificent Dispositions to receive them.

Hague, August 27. An Express, arrived this Morning, has brought an Account of the sudden Death of the Emperor of Germany, at Inspruck: His Imperial Majesty was seized with a Fit of an Apoplexy and fell into the Arms of his Son the King of the Romans, who was sitting next him.

The Hereditary Prince and Princess of Brunswick are expected here on Sunday or Monday next; and the Prince of Orange has offered them the House in the Wood, near this Town, as long as their Royal and Serene Highnesses may chuse to remain there.
