St James's, September 10. In the Evening the Duke of York arrived at his Houfe in Pallmall. And laft Night the Prince and Princefs of Brunswick arrived at the Apartments late his Royal Highness the Duke of Cumberland's.

General Post-Office, June 8, 1765. **PUBLICK** Notice is hereby given, That by an Act passed the last Session of Parliament, For altering certain Rates of Postage, and for 4' amending, explaining, and enlarging feveral Pro-4' visions in the Act of the Ninth of Queen Anne, " and other Acts relating to the Post-Office;" It is, amongst other Things, Enacted,

That Letters between London and any Port within the British Dominions in America, (in which all His Majetty's Weft-India Iflands are included) fhall pay Single One Shilling, Double Two Shillings, Treble

Three Shillings, the Ounce Four Shillings. That Letters, by Sea, from any one Port to any other Port within the faid Dominions, fhall pay Single Four Pence, Double Eight Pence, Treble One Shilling, the Ounce One Shilling and Four Pence.

That Letters, by Land, to or from any Chief Post-Office in America, from or to any other Part thereof not exceeding Sixty Miles from fuch Chief Post-Office, or from the Office where fuch Letters, not passing through a Chief Office, may be put in, fhall pay Single Four Pence, Double Eight Pence, Treble One Shilling, the Ounce One Shilling and Four Pence. And being upwards of Sixty, and not exceeding One Hundred Miles within the faid Dominions, shall pay Single Six Pence, Double One Shilling, Treble One Shilling and Six Pence, the Ounce Two Shillings. And being upwards of One Hundred, and not ex-ceeding Two Hundred Miles within the faid Dominions, fhall pay Single Eight Pence, Double One Shilling and Four Pence, Treble Two Shillings, the Ounce Two Shillings and Eight Pence. And for every Diftance not exceeding One Hundred Miles above fuch Two Hundred, and for every fuch fur-ther Diftance within the faid Dominions, fhall pay Single Two Pence, Double Four Pence, Treble Six Pence, the Ounce Eight Pence.

That no Veffel shall be permitted to break Bulk, or make Entry in any Port within the Britif Dominions, where Posts are or may be established, until all Letters on board are delivered to the Postmaster of such Port (he paying the Bringer One Penny for each

Letter) to be forwarded according to their respective Directions, except fuch as are excepted by the Act of the Ninth of Queen Anne; and fuch as may be brought by Veffels liable to Quarentine, which laft are to be delivered to the Perfons superintending the Quarentine, for proper Care, before they are for-warded by the Post. And that all Masters, Mariners, Passengers, &c. neglecting to deliver the Letters as aforefaid, shall, for every Neglect, forfeit Twenty Pounds.

That the Poltmaster shall take for every Letter brought by fuch Veffel, for any Place within his Delivery, One Penny, above the Penny paid to the Master or other Ferson for the same.

That Letters conveyed in Great Britain and Ireland, not exceeding one Stage, shall pay Single One Penny, Double Two Pence, Treble Three Pence, the Ounce Four Pence. And in England, above one and not exceeding two Stages, Single Two Pence, Double Four Pence, Treble Six Pence, the Ounce Eight Pence ; but these Rates are not to affect the Penny-Poft.

That Letters passing between England and Ireland, through Carlifle, Dumfries, Port Patrick, and Donagbadee, shall pay the fame Rates of English, Scetch, Irish, and Packet Poltage, according to the Diftance or Number of Stages they are conveyed in each Kingdom, as are fettled by the Act of the Ninth of Queen Anne, or by this Act. That no Packet exceeding the Weight of Four

Ounces shall be fent by the Penny-Post ; unless coming from, or paffing thereby to the General Poft.

That Letters pailing between London and Hamburgh shall pay as Letters between London and all other Parts of Germany, viz. Single One Shilling, Double Two Shillings, Treble Three Shillings, the Ounce Four Shillings.

That any Officer of the Post-Office fecreting or destroying any Letter, Bag or Mail of Letters, con-taining any Bank Note, Bill, or other Paper, Wriing, or Order for the Payment of Money ; or stealing out of any Letter any fuch Bank Note, Bill, &c. on Conviction, shall fuffer Death as a Felon.

That any Perfon robbing a Mail, in any Place or in any Manner whatfoever, although it may not ap-pear that any one was put in Fear by fuch Robbery, fhall, on Conviction, fuffer Death as a Felon.

That any Officer of the Post Office, entrusted to take in Letters, and receive the Postage the cof, embezzling the Money received, or deftroying the Letters; or any Officer advancing the Rates on Letters, and not accounting for the advanced Poltage, shall, on Conviction, be deemed guilty of Felony.

That any Poll-Boy having a Mail or Bag of Let-ters under his Care, deferting the fame before his Arrival at the next Stage; or fuffering any other, Perfon to ride on the Horfe or Carriage along therewith ; or loitering on the Road ; or not, in all poffible Cafes, conveying the Mail after the Rate of Six measured Miles an Hour, shall, on Conviction, before one justice of the Peace, be fent to the House of Correction for any Time not exceeding One Month, nor lefs than Fourteen Days.

That any Post-Boy, fingly, or in Combination with others, unlawfully collecting, or corveying Letters, or caufing the fame to be unlawfully con-veyed, fhall, on Conviction, before one Juffice of the Peace, forfeit Ten Shillings, to be paid to the Informer,

Informer, for every Letter fo unlawfully collected, And if the Forfeiture is conveyed, or delivered. not immediately paid, shall be fent to the House of Correction, for any Time not exceeding Two Months, nor less than One Month.

That all Rates of Letters, and all Forfeitures, mentioned in this Act, shall be paid in Sterling Money of Great Britain.

The Rates established by this Act for the Port of Letters between London and Hamburgh ; and the Limitation of the Weight of Packets to be fent by the Penny-Post, commence from the Fifth of July next. All other Regulations, Rates of Postage, Pains, Penalties, and Forfeitures beforementioned, com mence from the Tenth Day of October next.
