St. James's, September 21.

ON Wednesday Evening the 18th instant His Royal Highness the young Prince was christened, in the Great Council Chamber, by his Grace the Archbishop of Canterbury. His Royal Highness was named William Henry: The Sponsors were, their Royal Highnesses the Duke of Gloucester, Prince Henry Frederick, and the Princess of Brunwick.

The King has been pleased to constitute and appoint John Campbell, Esq; commonly called Marquess of Lorne, Lieutenant General of His Majesty's Forces, to be Colonel of the Second Battalion of the First, or Royal Regiment of Foot, late under the Command of Sir Henry Erskine, Bart. deceased; and likewise to be Captain of a Company in the said Second Battalion.

The King has been pleased to constitute and appoint Richard Pierfon, Esq; Major General of His Majesty's Forces, to be Colonel of the 36th Regiment of Foot, late under the Command of Robert Manners, commonly called Lord Robert Manners; and likewise to be Captain of a Company in the said Regiment.

The King has been pleased to constitute and appoint Studholme Hodgson, Esq; Lieutenant General of His Majesty's Forces, to be Governor of Fort George and Fort Augustus in North Britain, whereof Lieutenant General Sir Charles Howard, Knight of the Bath, deceased, was late Governor.

The King has been pleased to constitute and appoint John Leigh, Esq; to be Captain of Carrisbrook Castle, and the Fortifications thereunto belonging, in the Isle of Wight.

The King has been pleased to constitute and appoint Charles Forbes, Esq; to be Captain of that Company whereof James Gorry, Esq; deceased, was late Captain, in the 66th Regiment of Foot, commandad by Adam Gordon, Esq; commonly called Lord Adam Gordon.

The King has been pleased to constitute and appoint James Robertson, Esq; to be Barrack Master General to all His Majesty's Forces serving in North America.

St. James's, September 20.

This Day M. Landriani, Minister from the Duke of Modena, had his first private Audience of His Majesty, to deliver his Credentials.

To which he was introduced by the Right Honourable Henry Seymour Conway, Esq; one

of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State; and conducted by Sir Charles Cottrell Dormer, Knt. Master of the Ceremonies.

 " them You Must not think your Wath Men will
 " fritten us for as Wee Are Resolved for To Clear
 " Ouré Way Weel foun Dow for them You Say
 " Before you Will Submit To A Collier you Will
 " Los your Rite hand but Sum of us Will Make
 " You Submite before Winter be ovear And the
 " Devil Will Make you Submit better I Would Tel
 " you My Name but My Simplicity Will Not Let
 " Mee".
