Milford, Decemb. 21.

Here is arrived the *Mary* of *Leverpoole*, *James Caribbrooke* Master, from *Bourdeaux*; the *Robert* of *Coleran*, *Robert Alison* Master, from *St. Martins*; as likewise a Dogger of *London*, *George Mayner* Master. Here is also a *Southampton* Vessel from *Alicant*, which was in great danger. Just now we have the sad news of two considerable ships cast away near this Harbor; the one coming from the *Canaries*, the men all saved; the other was driven upon the Rocks, and broken in pieces, the men all drowned; it is thought she came from the *Streights*.

Pendennis, Decemb. 26. We hear daily of several Wrecks from Sea; on Wednesday last arrived here the *Concord* of *London*, Captain *Wilshire* Commander, laden with Sugars and Oyls from *Lisbon*. On Thursday came in here the *Alicant* Merchant of *Plymouth*, Mr. *Orchard* Commander, they were in great danger off of *Scilly*, having lost their Rudder, &c. The of *Weymouth*, Mr. *Ousley* Commander, from the *Canaries*, and another Vessel from *Bourdeaux*.

Plymouth, Decemb. 26. Every day brings with it an account of great losses at Sea, and all these Coasts are full of Wrecks. From *Mounts-Bay* in *Cornwall* they write, That five Rudders of ships had been driven ashore, and that it was feared all the men as well as ships were lost. Three ships were yesterday cast away to the Westward of the Royal Citadel; the *George* of *Hull*, *Robert Wright* Master, laden with Wines from *Bourdeaux*; the *Spread-Eagle* of *Dover* likewise from *Bourdeaux*; and the *St. Job* of *Naerden*, *John Peter* Master. This day are arrived five ships in *Cartwater*, in a violent storm, so we know not what they are.

Diitto, Decemb. 28. This morning arrived here a French Man of War mounted with 54 Guns, having been in great danger in the late bad weather. We have this day Letters from *Mounts-Bay* in *Cornwall*, which give an account of a great many ships of the *Bourdeaux* Fleet, that have been cast away in that Bay. Here are at present about 16 Sail in Port, as well outward, as homeward bound.

Truro, Decemb. 27. We have advice, that on Thursday and Friday last, were cast away in *Mounts-Bay*, nine ships belonging to several Ports on this Coast.

Falmouth, Decemb. 27. The 23 instant came in here the *Alicant* Merchant of *Plymouth*, from *Alicant*, she came thence in company of four more, from whom she separated about 14 dayes since. The 26 came in the *Providence* of *London* from the *Canaries*, the Master tells us of a very good Vintage they have had there this year. We hear of many Wrecks betwixt this place and the Lands-end.

Stockton, Decemb. 28. On Friday and Saturday last arrived here six Vessels belonging to this place from *Rotterdam*, they tell us of many ships that have been lost in the late violent storms upon the Coast of *Holland*.

Porsmouth, Decemb. 30. Here is come in a small *Pink* of *London*, homeward bound, from *Bourdeaux*; the Master tells us, that he came from thence in company of above 100 Sail, all English, bound for several Ports

of this Kingdom, but that in foul weather he was separated from them.

Rome, Decemb. 7. There being at present two places void in the Colledge of Cardinals, it is said the Most Christian King pretends to have them disposed of at his nomination. From *Sicily* our Letters tell us, that the Spanish Armada hath so greatly suffered in the late storms (for besides those ships that were lost near the Fare of *Messina*, the others are extremely shattered) that it will not be able in some time to join with Lieutenant Admiral *de Ruyter*, to oppose the passage of the French, who are bringing a fresh supply to *Messina*; if that arrive there in any time, the Inhabitants will be in good heart again, but otherwise it's believed they will be so far discouraged, that the Spaniards promise themselves some favourable Conjunction. The Extraordinary Nuncio's designed to the several Courts are still here, by reason of the difficulties which arise concerning their Reception there.

Naples, Decemb. 10. The Dutch Men of War that arrived here some dayes since, were commanded by the Vice-Admiral *de Haen*, they continue still here, in expectation of Lieutenant Admiral *de Ruyter* with the rest of his ships, who is so much the more impatiently desired, for that we understand that the *Messineses* begin again to be reduced to great straits; and that if *de Ruyter* could but be early enough to shut up the passage to the succors that are daily expected from France, those Inhabitants would not be able to subsist. We expect here a good supply of men from *Milan*, who come by Sea from *Finale*. The Prince of *Montesarchio* continues at *Palermo*, but it's said his ships are in a very ill condition. This week several other Banditi are come in, and submitted themselves, upon promise of pardon, on condition to serve against *Messina*.

Venice, Decemb. 13. On Monday last arrived here the ship called the *Sun*, on whom came Signior *Quirina* from *Constantinople*, where he hath resided as Ambassador on the part of this State. The Plague we hear is very violent in most of the Turkish Territories, which is the reason that the War is not more vigorously carried on against the *Poles*; however we are told, that the Grand Visier, who is said to be much dissatisfied that this Summer has passed with so little action on their part, declares he will himself march against the *Poles* in the Spring.

Genova, Decemb. 18. The 11 instant arrived here the *Bonadventure*, *William Fearn* Master, from *Cagliari*; and the next day the *Success*, *Robert Wood* Master, from the same place. The 16 arrived Sir *John Berry* in the *Bristol*, with the *Newfoundland* Merchant, and the Merchant *Bonadventure* under his Convoy, from *Spain*, having been obliged by bad weather to shelter themselves in this Port. The 16 likewise arrived the *Thomas* and *John Ketch* from *Legorn*.

Vienna, Decemb. 22. From *Hungary* we have advice, That 4000 Imperialists being informed that the Rebels were in a good Body at *Drbrein*, and that they had brought thither their Gods, with intention to make that the place of their Rendezvous, marched forthwith thither

smith, fell upon the Rebels that were there; and cut them all in pieces, making purchase of their Goods. Here is lately arrived a Religious Tent by General *Montecuculi*, to give his Imperial Majesty an account of the present posture of his Forces, which it's said will be recruited to above 40000 men, to act in one Body the next Campaigne in *Alsacia*. The said General *Montecuculi* has finally obtained leave to return hither, and it is believed his Excellency is already on his way.

Strasburgh, Decemb. 27. Some dayes since arrived in the *Lower Alsacia*, above 1000 Wagons laden with corn, and all kind of provisions, and destined, as is believed, to *Philipsburgh*, to Convoy which thither, the French that are quartered in our Neighborhood begin to draw together.

Hamburg, Decemb. 30. The King of Denmark having received the Oath of Allegiance from the Magistrates of *Wismar* in person, and given the necessary orders for the putting his Army into Winter-quarters, is on his return to *Copenhagen*; the Government of *Wismar* is given to Major General *Scaech*. On the same day that *Wismar* was taken, Major General *Aronsdarf*, (who we formerly told you was sent from the Danish Camp with a Body of Men to observe the motions of Count *Goringmark*) attacked a small place called *Ribnitz* near *Dengarsen*, where the Swedes had put 400 Men to gather Contributions from the Countrey of *Mecklenburgh*, and took it, all the Swedes being made Prisoners.

Articles for the Surrender of *Wismar*, Concluded and Signed the 3d of December, 1675.

I. That the *Mecklenburg Gate* shall yet this Evening be delivered up to his Majesty.

II. That the Garrison, as well Horse as Foot, shall march out so morrow with Arms, Bag and Baggage, Drums beating, Colours flying, &c. to some Neighbouring Village, where they are to remain, till their Officers, who have three dayes to adjust their businesses with the Burgers, shall join them; they being obliged to provide themselves with Bread, till they come to *New Bukaw*, from whence his Majesty will take care to supply them with Bread and Carriages to *Straellsond*.

III. All the other Officers, as well Civil as Military, in the service of the Crown of Sweden, who have their dwellings in the City, shall be at liberty to depart with their Families and Goods, or otherwise to continue there under his Majesties Protection.

IV. The Ammunition, and all Military Provisions, shall be delivered up to his Majesty.

V. The Records, and other publick Papers, shall be put into the hands of his Majesty.

VI. The City, and its Inhabitants, shall enjoy all their Priviledges and Immunities.

The next day the Garrison accordingly marched out, and the 16 the King made his publick Entry, and received in the Stadt-house the Homage and Allegiance of the Magistrates.

Brussels, Jan. 3. The Officers begin to expect with some impatience their Commissions for the making of the Recruits and new Levies, which it seems will not be given out, till the monies promised arrive from *Spain*. The Count of *Kilmansacke*, who hath treated with the Duke de *Vilva Herposia* to raise three Regiments of German Foot, is likewise detained here on the same account. We have this afternoon advice, that the first in *Bant* at night, the great Magazine which had been provided at *Aeth* of Hay and Straw, had been burnt by an accidental fire. From *Liege* we hear, that the Boors finding it impossible to subsist any longer there, remove

in great numbers with their whole Families, higher up into *Germany*, so that that whole Countrey will almost become desolate.

Dinor, Jan. 7. Yesterday arrived the Spanish Ordinary, and brought Bills of Exchange for a considerable Sum of Money, though with orders, as is said, not to employ the same for the making the intended Levies and Recruits, but towards the payment of the Subsidies due to *Denmark*, and the Elector of *Brandenburgh*. The Letters from *Spain* seem to speak, as if the Queen was about quitting the Government, and retiring into a Monastery, either at *Toledo*, or *Granada*; and that *Don Juan of Austria* was to come to Court, to perform the part of first Minister of State. On Friday last, the Marquis de *Conflans*, Governor of *Namur*, marched out from thence, with 400 Foot, and 200 Horse, directly to *Chastlet*, a small Town on the *sambre*, near to *Charleroy*, in which was a French Garrison; and having attacked it, took it by Assault, most of the French being cut in pieces, and the rest made Prisoners of War, and the Town given to the pillage of the Soldiers. The last week some Squadrons of Horse were sent from *Cambray* and *Valenciennes*, under the command of the Baron de *Torcy*, and the Baron de *Fen*, to cover the Regiment of *Cross* that was sent out beyond *St. Quentin*, to execute several Villages for failing to pay their Contributions: The Baron de *Torcy* hapned to encounter with seven Squadrons of French Horse belonging to *St. Quentin*, and in the dispute he was killed or taken Prisoner, though his men made good their retreat; but the *Croats* in their return hapned to meet with the said party of French, and totally routed them.

Marseilles, Decemb. 24. By a Vessel arrived here, we have advice, that about 14 dayes since, Lieutenant-Admiral de *Ruyter* parted from *Cagliari*, with the Men of War under his command, 1st *Naples*, where, it's said, he is to join 10 Spanish Men of War; it is very probable some Action may happen between them and the French Fleet that lately sailed from *Thoulon*, consisting in 20 stout Men of War, and 6 or 7 Fireships.

Paris, Jan. 4. The 23 past, died at his house here in Town *Cesar de Choiseul*, Marechal du *Plessys*, Duke and Peer of *France*, in the Seventy eighth year of his age; famous for his Military Actions: having been in thirty seven Sieges, and in eight Batels: and particularly that of *Rhetel*, during the troubles, which he gained with so much honour and advantage to the Crown. From *Strasburgh* of the 27th instant they write, That the French continue to make great preparations in those parts, and to give the Imperialists great inquietness; That a great many Boats were daily brought to *Brisac*, for the making a Bridge there over the *Rhine*; That they set the whole Neighbouring Countrey under Contribution, and draw great quantities of Hay and Straw from the several Towns and Villages.

Ditto, We have advice, That the Marquis de *Lanzen* being entred into *Luxemburgh* with 500 Horse, hapned to meet with a party of the Enemies belonging to *Treves*, at least as strong as his, that they engaged and maintained a very sharp Fight, in which above 500 were killed upon the place; the Marquis de *Lanzen* had his Arm broke, and the Officer that commanded the Enemies Party was taken Prisoner. Our Plenipotentiaries are, we hear, arrived at *Charleville*, where, it's said, they will continue, till they understand that the other Ambassadors are likewise on their way to *Nimwegen*.
