Naples, September 3. IS Britannick Majefty's Frigate the Thames, Capt. Eliott, put into this Port on Wednefday laft, and on Saturday failed for Conflaminople. Florence, September 7. The Great Duke and

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Florence, September 7. The Great Duke and Dutchefs are expected at Bologna as To-morrow, where, it is fuppofed, their Royal Highneffes will only lie one Night: All the Great Officers of the Court and four Pages are gone thither; and Marfhal Botta is fet out this Morning. Detachments of the Garde Noble, and of the Dragoons, are placed at Pietra-Mala, a Place near the Confines, where their Royal Highneffeare to dine, and from whence they will proceed directly to Pratolino; a Villa of the Great Duke, about fix Miles diffant from Florence. All publick Rejoicings are to be deferred for fome Months. The particular Orders for the Mourning will be published after the Great Duke's Arrival.

Florence, September 14. The Great Duke and Dutchefs arrived late on Wednefday Morning at Pratolino, about fix Miles Diftance from hence, and came into the Town Yefferday Morning at Eight o'Clock. Their Royal Highnefles were conducted to their Palace amidf the Acclamations of many Thoulands of People.

Venice, Exptember 11. On the 4th Inflant the Great Dake and Dut hefs of Tufcany paffed through the Venetian State on their Journey to Florence, and were efforted by a Party of Horfe. They flopped feveral Hours at Caffel Nuovo, and were pleafed to accept of a Dinner that was provided for them. The Great Duke fent for the Podeffa of Verona, and, in the moft gracious Manner, obliged his Excellency, and two of the principal Venetian Officers, to fit down at Table with their Royal and muft Screne Higher fles, who chofe to travel the moft private VI ay upon account of the Excellency of the Emperor. The Great Duke small the Podeffa 2 Prefent of a Gold Chain, with the Empreis Quien's Picture affixed to it; and gave Money to the Troops; and Snuff boxis to two Ven tian Couriers that attended.

Vienna, September 14. On Wednefday last all the Ambassadors here had private Audiences of the prefent Emperor, to compliment him upon his Acc film to the Imperial 1 hrone.

Madrid, Sepander 16. Two Spanish Ships of War, the Achilles, and Aftrea, arrived lately at Cadiz from New Spain, and have brought above two Millions of Dollars in Gold and Silver, befiles many valuable Effects; about one Half of the Money is for the Catholick King's Account; and the Remainder for the Commerce.

General Post-Office, June 8, 1765. UBLICK Notice is hereby given, That by an Act passed the last Session of Parliament, "For altering certain Rates of Postage, and for "amending, explaining, and enlarging several Provisions in the Act of the Ninth of Queen Anne, and other Acts relating to the Post-Office;" It is, amongst other Things, Enacted,

That Letters between London and any Port within the British Dominions in America, (in which all His Majetty's West-India Islands are included) shall pay Single One Shilling, Double Two Shillings, Treble Three Shillings, the Ounce Four Shillings.

Three Shillings, the Ounce Four Shillings. That Letters, by Sea, from any one Port to any other Port within the faid Dominions, fhall pay Single Four Pence, Double Eight Pence, Treble One Shilling, the Ounce One Shilling and Four Pence.

That Letters, by Land, to or from any Chief Polt-Office in America, from or to any other Part thereof not exceeding Sixty Miles from fuch Chief Polt-Office, or from the Office where fuch Letters, not paffing through a Chief Office, may be put in, fhall pay Single Four Pence, Double Eight Pence, Treble One Shilling, the Ounce One Shilling and Four Pence. And being upwards of Sixty, and not exceeding One Hundred Miles within the faid Dominions, fhall pay Single Six Pence, Double One Shilling, Treble One Shilling and Six Pence, the Ounce Two Shillings And being upwards of One Hundred, and not exceeding Two Hundred Miles within the faid Dominions, fhall pay Single Eight Pence, Double One Shilling and Four Pence, Treble Two Shillings, the Ounce Two Shillings and Eight Pence. And for every Diftance not exceeding One Hundred Miles gbove fuch Two Hundred, and for every fuch fur-

ther Diffance within the faid Dominions, fhall pay Single Two Pence, Double Four Pence, Treble Siz Pence, the Ounce Eight Pence.

That no Vessel shall be permitted to break Bulk, or make Entry in any Port within the *British* Dominions, where Posts are or may be established, until all Letters on board are delivered to the Postmaster of such Port (he paying the Bringer One Penny for each Letter) to be forwarded according to their respective Directions, except fuch as are excepted by the Act of the Ninth of Queen Anne; and fuch as may be brought by Vessel liable to Quarentine, which last are to be delivered to the Persons superintending the Quarentine, for proper Care, before they are forwarded by the Post. And that all Masters, Mariners, Passengers, &c. reglecting to deliver the Letters as aforenaid, shall, for every Neglect, forfeit Twenty Pounds.

That the Postmaster shall take for every Letter brought by such Vessel, for any Place within his Delivery, One Penny, above the Penny paid to the Master or other Person for the same.

That Letters conveyed in *Great Britain* and *Ireland*, not exceeding one Stage, fhall pay Single One Penny, Double Two Pence, Treble Three Pence, the Ounce Four Pence. And in *England*, above one and not exceeding two Stages. Single Two Pence, Double Four Pence, Treble Six Pence, the Ounce Eight Pence; but thefe Rates are not to affect the Penny-Poft.

That Letters paffing between England and Ireland, through Carlifle, Dumfries, Port Patrick, and Donagbadee, shall pay the same Rates of Englifle, Scotch. Irifle, and Packet Postage, according to the Distance or Number of Stages they are conveyed in each Kingdom, as are settled by the Act of the Ninth of Queen Anne, or by this Act.

That no Packet exceeding the Weight of Four Ounces shall be fent by the Penny Post; unless coming from, or passing thereby to the General Post.

That Letters paffing between London and Hamburgh fhall pay as Letters between London and all other Parts of Germany, viz. Single One Shilling, Double Two Shillings, Treble Three Shillings, the Ounce Four Shillings.

That any Officer of the Poft-Office fecreting or deftroying any Letter, Bag or Mail of Letters, containing any Bank Note, Bill, or other Paper, Wriing, or Order for the Payment of Money; or stealing out of any Letter any such Bank Note, Bill, &c. on Conviction, shall suffer Death as a Felon.

That any Perfon robbing a Mail, in any Place or in any Manner whatfoever, although it may not appear that any one was put in Fear by fuch Robbery, shall, on Conviction, fuffer Death as a Felon.

That any Officer of the Poft Office, entrusted to take in Letters, and receive the Postage thereof, embezzling the Money received, or destroying the Letters; or any Officer advancing the Rates on Letters, and not accounting for the advanced Postage, shall, on Conviction, be deemed guilty of Felony.

That any Poft-Boy having a Mail or Bag of Letters under his Care, deferting the fame before his Arrival at the next Stage; or fuffering any other Perfon to ride on the Horfe or Carriage along therewith; or loitering on the Road; or not, in all poffible Cafes, conveying the Mail after the Rate of Six measured Miles an Hour, fhall, on Conviction, before one Juffice of the Peace, be fent to the Houfe of Correction for any Time not exceeding One Month, nor lefs than Fourteen Days.

That any Post-Boy, fingly, or in Combination with others, unlawfully collecting, or conveying Letters, or caufing the fame to be unlawfully conveyed, shall, on Conviction, before one Justice of the Peace, forseit Ten Shillings, to be paid to the Informer, for every Letter so unlawfully collected, conveyed, or delivered. And if the Forseiture is not immediately paid, shall be fent to the House of Correction, for any Time not exceeding Two Months, nor lefs than One Month.
