Lisbon, September 21.

HE Duke of York Packet arrived here on Sunday the 15th, and the Expedition Packet the next Day.

The Marquis d'Almodovar, his Catholic Majefty's Ambaffador at this Court, received a Courier on Tuesday the 10th Instant with the News of the Marriage of the Prince of Asturias to the Princess of Parma having been celebrated on the 4th at St. Ildefonso.

on the 4th at St. Ildefonfo. The Count de Welfperg, Minister Plenipotentiary from their Imperial Majesties, received Yesterday the Letters from his Court, to notify the Death of the Emperor at Inspruck on the 18th of August.

His Britannick Majefty's Frigate the Montreal, the Honourable Keith Stuart, Commander, arrived here laft Week, and will return very foon to Gibraltar and Minorca.

Florence, September 21. The Great Duke and Dutchefs are to remain in Retirement till the End of fix Weeks, from the Day of the Emiperor's Death; neverthelefs his Royal Highnefs has fucceffively given Audience to the Heads of all the Tribunals, and of the principal Magistracies, and has admitted many of them, and other diffinguished People of the Country, every Day to his Table.

The Grand Prior Corfini, who before had only the Title of First Ecuyer, is appointed Master of the Horse.

A large Quantity of Bread and a confiderable Sum of Money have been diffributed to the Poor, and to Families in Diffrefs; and a certain Number of Infolvent Debtors have been releafed from Prifon.

The Letters from Rome brought an Account of the Death of Cardinal Buffy, by which Fifteen Cardinals Hats are vacant.

Drefden, September 25. The Court propofes to leave Pilnitz the 3d of next Month, and return to Drefden for the Winter. Princes Elizabeth has been ill of a Fever and fore Throat; but her Royal Highness is now out of Danger.

Venice, September 25. By an Edict from the Magistrates of Health, the Quarantine of Veffels from Dalmatia is reduced from 21 to 14 Days.

Hambourgh, October 1. On the 26th paft the Imperial Minister Count Raab had a folemn Service, accompanied with Musick, performed in his Chapel, by Order of his Court, on account of the Deccase of the late Emperor; to which all the Foreign Ministers were invited.

Hague, Offober 4. Last Saturday Evening the Princess of Nassau-Weilbourg was happily

delivered of a Prince's, who was christened on Wedne'day. The Sponfors were the Hereditary Prince's of Heffe, with the Hereditary Princes of Naffau Ufingens and Naffau Saarbruck.

General Post-Office, June 8, 1765. UBLICK Notice is hereby given, That by an Act passed the last Session of Parliament, "For altering certain Rates of Postage, and for "amending, explaining, and enlarging several Provisions in the Act of the Ninth of Queen Anne, and other Acts relating to the Post-Office;" It is, amongst other Things, Enasted,

That Letters between London and any Port within the British Dominions in America, (in which all His Majefty's West-India Islands are included) shall pay Single One Shilling, Double Two Shillings, Treble Three Shillings, the Ounce Four Shillings.

Three Shillings, the Ounce Four Shillings. That Letters, by Sca, from any one Port to any other Port within the faid Dominions, fhall pay Single Four Pence, Double Eight Pence, Treble One Shilling, the Ounce One Shilling and Four Pence,

That Letters, by Land, to or from any Chief Poff-Office in America, from or to any other Part thereof not exceeding Sixty Miles from fuch Chief Poft Office, or from the Office where fuch Letters, not passing through a Chief Office, may be put in, shall pay Single Four Perce, Double Eight Pence, Treble One Shilling, the Ounce One Shilling and Four Pence. And

And being upwards of Sixty, and not exceeding One Hundred Miles within the faid Dominions, fhall pay Single Six Pence, Double One Shilling, Treble One Shilling and Six Pence, the Ounce Two Shillings. And being upwards of One Hundred, and not ex-ceeding Two Hundred Miles within the faid Dominjons, shall pay Single Eight Pence, Double One Shilling and Four Pence, Treble Two Shillings, the Ounce Two Shillings and Eight Perce. And for every Diftance not exceeding One Hundred Miles above such The Hundred, and for every such further Diffance within the faid Dominions, fhali pay Single Γ wo Pence, Double Four Pence, Treble Six Pence, the Ounce Eight Pence.

That no Veffel shall be permitted to break Bulk, or make Entry in any Port within the British Dominions, where Pofts are or may be established, until all Letters on board are delivered to the Foftmafter of such Port (he paying the Bringer One Penny for each Letter) to be forwarded according to their respective Directions, except fuch as are excepted by the Act of the Ninth of Queen Arne; and tuch as may be brought by Veffels liable to Quarentine, which late are to be delivered to the Performs superintending the Quarentine, for prove. Care, before they are for warded by the Pote. And that all Maders, Mariners Paffengers, &c reglecting to deliver the Letter is aforefaid, fhad, for every Neglect, forfeit I wenty Pounds.

That any Officer of the Post-Office fecreting or destroying any Letter, Bag or Mail of Letters, con-taining any Bank Note, Bill, or other Paper, Wriing, or Order for the Payment of Money ; or flealing out of any Letter any fuch Bank Note, Bill, &c. on Conviction, shall fuffer Death as a Felon.

That any Perfon robbing a Mail, in any Place or in any Manner whatfoever, although it may not appear that any one was put in Fear by fuch Robbery, Ihall, on Conviction, suffer Death as a Felon.

That any Officer of the Post Office, entrusted to take in Letters, and receive the Postage thereof, embezzling the Money received, or deffroying the Letters; or any Officer advancing the Rates on Letters, and not accounting for the advanced Postage, shall, on Conviction, be deemed guilty of Felony.

That any Post-Boy having a Mail or Bag of Let-ters under his Care, deferting the fame before his Arrival at the next Stage; or fuffering any other Perfon to ride on the Horfe or Carriage along there-

with; or loitering on the Road; or not, in all poffible Cates, conveying the Mail after the Rate of Six measured Miles an Hour, thall, on Conviction, before one juffice of the Peace, be fent to the Houfe of Co rection for any Time not exceeding One Month, nor leis than Fourteen Days.

That any Post-Boy, fing'y, or in Combination with others, unlawfully councing, or conveying Letter, or causing the same to be unlawfully con-veyed, shall, on Conviction, before one Justice of the Peace, forfeit Ten Shilling, to be paid to the Informer, for every Letter fo unlawfully collected, conveyed, or delivered. And if the Forfeiture is not immediately paid, thail be fent to the Houfe of Correction, for any Time not exceeding Two Months, nor lefs than One Month.

That all Rates of Letters, and all Forfeitures, mentioned in this Act, shall be paid in Sterling Money of Great Britain. The Rates established by this A& for the Port of
