Hundred Miles within the faid Dominions, shall pay Single Six Pence, Double One Shilling, Treble One Shilling and Six Pence, the Ounce Two Shillings. And being upwards of One Hundred, and not exceeding Two flundred Miles within the faid Dominions, shall pay Single Eight Pence, Double One Shilling and Four Pence, Treble Two Shillings, the Ounce Two Shillings and Eight Pence. And for every Diftance not exceeding One Hundred Miles above such Two Hundred, and for every such further Diftance within the faid Dominions, fhall pay Single Two Pence, Double Four Pence, Treble Six Pence, the Ounce Eight Pence.

That no Veffel shall be permitted to break Bulk, or make Entry in any Port within the Britifb Dominions, where Pofts are or may be established, until all Letters on board are delivered to the Poftmafter of Juch Port (he paying the Bringer One Penny for each Letter) to be forwarded according to their respective Directions, except fuch as are excepted by the Act of the Ninth of Queen Anne; and fuch as may be brought by Veffels liable to Quarentine, which laft are to be delivered to the Perfons fuperintending the Quarentine, for proper Care, before they are for-warded by the Polt. And that all Masters, Mariners, Paffengers, &c. reglecting to deliver the Letters as aforefaid, fhall, for every Neglect, forfeit Twenty Pounds.

That the Poltmaster shall take for every Letter brought by fuch Veffel, for any Place within his Delivery, One Penny, above the Penny paid to the Matter or other Perfon for the fame.

That Letters conveyed in Great Britain and Ireland, not exceeding one Stage, shall pay Single One Penny, Double Two Pence, Treble Three Pence, the Ounce Four Pence. And in England, above one and not exceeding two Stages, Single Two Pence, Dou. ble Four Pence, Treble Six Pence, the Ounce Eight Pence ; but thefe Rates are not to affect the Penny-Poft.

That Letters passing between England and Ireland, through Carlifle, Dumfries, Port Patrick, and Donagbadce, fhall pay the fame Rates of English, Scotch, Irish, and Packet Pollage, according to the Diffance or Number of Stages they are conveyed, in each King-dom, as are fottled by the Act of the Ninth of Queen Anne, or by this Act.

That no Packet exceeding the Weight of Four Ounces shall be fent by the Penny-Post; unless com-Fig from, or paffing thereby to the General-Poft.

That Letters passing between London and Ham-Burgh shall pay as Letters between London and all other Parts of Germany, viz. Single One Shilling, Double Two Shillings, Treble Three Shillings, the Oance Four Shillings.

That any Officer of the Post-Office fecreting or deftroying any Letter, Bag or Mail of Letters, con-taining any Bank Note, Bill, or other Paper, Wriing, or Order for the Payment of Money ; or stealing out of any Letter any fuch Bank Note, Bill, &c. on Conviction, shall fuffer Death as a Felon.

That any Perfon robbing a Mail, in any Place or in any Manner whatfoever, although it may not appear that any one was put in Fear by fuch Robbery, ihall, on Conviction, fuffer Death as a Felon.

That any Officer of the Post Office, entrulled to take in Letters, and receive the Postage thereof, embezzling the Money received, or defroying the Lee ters; or any Officer advancing the Rates on Letters, and not accounting for the advanced Pollage, fhall, on Conviction, be deemed guilty of Felony.

That any Post-Boy having a Mail or Bag of Letters under his Care, deferting the fame before his Arrival at the next Stage; or fuffering any other Perfon to ride on the Horfe or Carriage along therewith; or loitering on the Road; or not, in all pollible Cafes, conveying the Mail after the Rate of Six measured Miles an Hour, shall, on Conviction, before one Juffice of the Peace, be fent to the Houfe of Correction for any Time not exceeding One Monthy nor lefs than Fourteen Days.

That any Post-Boy, fingly, or in Combination with others, unlawfully collecting, or conveying Letters, or caufing the fame to be unlawfully con-veyed, fhalh, on Conviction, before one Justice of the Peace, forfeit Ten Shillings, to be paid to the Informer, for every Letter fo unlawfully collected, conveyed, or delivered. And if the Forfeiture is conveyed, or delivered. And if the Forfeiture is not immediately paid, shall be sent to the House of Correction, for any Time not exceeding Two Months, nor lefs than One Month.

That all Rates of Letters, and all Forfeitures, mentioned in this Act, shall be paid in Sterling Mo-

ney of Great Britain. The Rates established by this Act for the Port of Letters between London and Hambargh ; and the Limitation of the Weight of Packets to be fent by the Penny-Post, commence from the Fifth of July All other Regulations, Rates of Postage, Pains, next. Penalties, and Forfeitures beforementioned, commence from the Tenth Day of October next.
