St. James's, October 25.
THIS Day being the Anniversary of the King's Accession the Throne, who entered into the Sixth Year of His Reign; there was a very numerous and brilliant Appearance of the Nobility, Foreign Ministers, and other Persons of Distinction; to compliment His Majesty on the Occasion. At Noon the Guns in the Park and at the Tower were fired; and in the Evening there were Bonfires, Illuminations, and other Publick Demonstrations of Joy throughout London and Westminster.

The KING's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

THIS Day His Grace Charles Duke of Richmond, Lenox and Aubigny, was, by His Majesty's Command, sworn of His Majesty's most Honourable Privy Council, and took his Place at the Board accordingly.

Venice, October 4. The Magistrates of Health, considering the very favourable Advices concerning the Plague in Bosnia, and the perfect Health of their Subjects in Dalmatia, have recalled their Troops, which formed the Line upon the Frontiers of Istria, and also the noble Venetian, who was sent into Dalmatia, upon Account of the Plague; to assist the Proveditor-General.

Florence, October 12. The English Gentlemen now residing here, have had the Honour to be presented by Name to the Great Duke and Dutchess, and were received in a very gracious Manner: Many Strangers of other Nations were also presented by Name: After which the Earl Cowper and Earl of Tilney were, by Order of the Great Duke, invited to Dinner, as were some of the most distinguished Strangers of each Nation who had been presented.

Berlin, October 15. Yesterday Morning the King of Prussia arrived here in perfect Health from Potsdam: He had afterwards a very numerous and splendid Levee, at which the Foreign Ministers residing at this Court assisted. General Nugent, the Austrian Minister, had a

private Audience of his Prussian Majesty; where he delivered his new Credential Letters.

This Morning the King of Prussia returned from hence to Potsdam.

About eight Days ago the Lady of M. de Zeithen, General of Horse in this Service, was safely delivered of a Son and Heir; and Yesterday being the Day fixed on for the Christening; the King and Queen of Prussia, the Princess Dowager of Prussia, the Princess Wilhelmina; Maigrave Henry and the two Princesses his Daughters, went all in great Pomp and Ceremony to the General's House, and stood Sponsors in Person to the new-born Child, whom his Majesty was pleased, immediately after the Ceremony of Baptism was performed; to appoint a Cornet of Horse.

Dublin Castle, October 18.

His Excellency the Earl of Hertford, Lord Lieutenant of this Kingdom; arrived here this Morning: His Excellency was received at Landing: by the Lord Mayor, Aldermen, Sheriffs, and Commons of the City of Dublin: The Foot Forces in Garrison lined the Streets through which his Excellency (attended by a Squadron of Horse) proceeded, amidst the Acclamations of the People, with the usual Ceremony, to the Castle, where, in Council, his Excellency took the Oaths appointed to be taken by the Lord Lieutenant of Ireland; and received the Sword from their Excellencies the Lords Justices; after which the Great Guns in His Majesty's Park the Phoenix were fired, and answered by Volleys from the Regiments on Duty, which were drawn out upon College Green; and his Excellency repairing to the Presence-Chamber, received there the Compliments of the Nobility, and other Persons of Distinction, upon his safe Arrival to take upon him the Government of this Kingdom.
