ON Thursday Night last, between Seven and Eight o'Clock, died suddenly, at his House in Upper Grosvenor Street, His Royal Highness the Duke of Cumberland, to the great Grief of their Majesties, and all the Royal Family.

Dublin Castle, October 24.

The Houses of Lords and Commons having unanimously resolved upon humble Addresses to His Majesty, the same, together with Addresses from both Houses to the Lord Lieutenant, were, this Day, presented to his Excellency, and, with his Excellency's Answers, are as follow.

Yesterday being the Anniversary of the Irish Rebellion in 1741, His Excellency the Lord Lieutenant proceeded in State to Christ Church, attended by the House of Peers, Judges, &c. and escorted by a Squadron of Horse; where a most excellent Sermon was preached by the Right Reverend and Honorable the Lord Bishop of Dromore upon that Occasion. The Sword of State was carried to and from the Church by the Earl of Mornington. After His Excellency's Return to the Castle, the Great Guns in His Majesty's Park the Phoenix were fired three Rounds, and answered by Volleys of Small Arms from the Regiments of Foot on Duty, drawn out in the Royal Square at the Barracks; and the Evening concluded with Bonfires, Illuminations, and all other Demonstrations of Joy.

Dublin Castle, October 26.

Yesterday being the Anniversary of His Majesty's happy Accession to the Throne, the Flag

was displayed on Birmingham Tower, the Great Guns in His Majesty's Park the Phoenix were fired three Rounds, and answered by Volleys of Small Arms from the Regiments of Foot on Duty, drawn out in the Royal Square at the Barracks: At Noon there was a very numerous and splendid Appearance of the Nobility, and other Persons of Distinction, at the Castle, to compliment his Excellency the Lord Lieutenant on the Occasion: In the Evening a Play was given by His Excellency for the Entertainment of the Ladies, and the Night concluded with Bonfires, Illuminations, and all other Demonstrations of Joy throughout the City.

Whereas my Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty have received authentick Information, that between the Hours of Eight and Nine o'Clock in the Evening of the 18th Day of July last, as a Merchant-Ship or Galliot, called the Lady Gabitba of Bremen, Hendrick Beckman, Master, laden with Linen Cloth and other Merchandize, was sailing from Bremen, for the Port of Bristol, the said Ship or Galliot was piratically and feloniously attacked on the High Sea, in the British Channel, off Beachy-Head, by a Ship or Vessel looking like a Cutter, with a long English Pendant, the Master and Crew whereof, being Englishmen, did then and there, by Force, plunder and rob the said Ship or Galliot called the Lady Gabitba, of a great Quantity of Linen Cloth, to a considerable Value, in Violation of the Laws of Nations; Their Lordships therefore, in order to detect and bring to Justice the Persons guilty of the said Piracy and Robbery, are pleased to promise a Reward of Five Hundred Pounds unto or amongst such Person or Persons as shall, within Six Months from this Time, discover any of the Offenders guilty of the above-mentioned Offence, so as such Offender or Offenders shall be apprehended and duly convicted thereof: Which Reward shall be paid, clear of all Deductions whatsoever, by Samuel Seddon, Esquire, Solicitor of the Admiralty, immediately after the Conviction of such Offender or Offenders.

And, as a further Encouragement, His Majesty is pleased to promise His most gracious Pardon to any of the said Offenders, who shall, within the Time aforesaid, discover and prosecute to Conviction, any one or more, other or others, of the said Offenders.
