Westminster; the Chief Mourner, and his two Supporters, sitting on Chairs at the Head of the Corpse; the Lords Assistants, and Supporters of the Pall, sitting on Stools on either Side.

The Part of the Service before the Interment being read, the Corpse was deposited in the Vault; and the Dean having finished the Burial-Service, Garter proclaimed his Royal Highness's Stile as

follows.

Thus it hath pleafed Almighty GOD to take out of this transitory Life, unto His Divine Mercy, the late most High, most Mighty, and most Illustrious Prince WILLIAM-AUGUSTUS, Duke of Cumberland, and Duke of Brunswic and Lunenburgh, Marquis of Berkhamstead, Earl of Kennington, Viscount Trematon, Baron of the Isle of Alderney, Knight of the most Noble Order of the Garter, and First and Principal Companion of the most Honourable Order of the Bath, third Son of His late most Excellent Majesty King GEORGE the Second.

Twenty-one Pieces of Artillery were drawn into the Park, and fired Minute Guns during the Ceremony; and three Battalions, viz. one of each Regiment of Guards, were drawn up in St. Margaret's Church-yard, and fired Vollies, on a Signal given, as foon as the Corpfe was deposited. The Minute-Guns at the Tower were fired as usual.
