Warsaw, October 30.

YESTERDAY an unfortunate Accident happened to the King's Brother, the Great Chamberlain of the Crown, who fell from his Horse as he was hunting, and received so violent a Blow, that those who were present did not think it possible for him to survive many Minutes; but immediate Assistance being given, he is now judged to be out of all Danger.

Berlin, November 9. Yesterday being the Queen of Prussia's Birth-day, her Majesty had in the Morning a very numerous and splendid Levée, when she received the Compliments usual on this Occasion, from the Princess Dowager of Prussia, and the rest of the Royal Family at present in Town; as also from the Foreign Ministers and Chief Nobility here. In the Evening her Royal Highness the Princess Dowager of Prussia gave at her House, in Honour of the Day, a most grand and magnificent Supper to the Queen of Prussia and the rest of the Royal Family; at which the Foreign Ministers and Principal Nobility likewise assisted. The Feast ended with a Ball, which lasted till Five o'Clock this Morning.

A few Days ago the Hereditary Prince of Courland, with the Princess his Consort, arrived in this Capital from Arolsen, on their Way to Mittau. They propose staying some Days here, in order to pay their Court to the King and Queen of Prussia, and the rest of the Royal Family.

St. James's, November 17.

This Day Hamed Aga, Ambassador from Tripoli, had his first private Audience of Her Majesty.

To which he was introduced by the Right Honourable Lord Viscount Cantalupe, Her Majesty's Vice-Chamberlain; and conducted by Stephen Cottrell, Esq; Assistant Master of the Ceremonies.

November 17.

This Day the Count de la Marmora, Envoy Extraordinary from the King of Sardinia, had his Audience of Leave;

And the Baron de la Perriere, his Successor in the same Character, had his first private Audience of her Royal Highness the Princess Dowager of Wales.

And afterwards they had Audience of his Royal Highness the Duke of York, his Royal Highness the Duke of Gloucester, and her Royal Highness the Hereditary Princess of Brunswick.

To all which they were introduced by Stephen Cottrell, Esq; Assistant Master of the Ceremonies.

Admiralty-Office, October 29, 1765.

WHEREAS my Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty have received authentick Information, that between the Hours of Eight and Nine o'Clock in the Evening of the 18th Day of July last, as a Merchant-Ship or Galliot, called the *Lady Gabitha* of Bremen, Hendrick Beckman, Master, laden with Linen Cloth and other Merchandize, was sailing from Bremen, for the Port of Bristol, the said Ship or Galliot was piratically and feloniously attacked on the High Sea, in the British Channel, off Beachy-Head, by a Ship or Vessel looking like a Cutter, with a long English Pendant, the Master and Crew whereof, being Englishmen, did then and there, by Force, plunder and rob the said Ship or Galliot called the *Lady Gabitha*, of a great Quantity of Linen-Cloth, to a considerable Value, in Violation of the Laws of Nations; Their Lordships therefore, in order to detect and bring to Justice the Persons guilty of the said Piracy and Robbery, are pleased to promise a Reward of Five Hundred Pounds unto or amongst such Person or Persons as shall, within Six Months from this Time, discover any of the Offenders guilty of the above-mentioned Offence, so as such Offender or Offenders shall be apprehended and duly convicted thereof: Which Reward shall be paid, clear of all Deductions whatsoever, by Samuel Seddon, Esquire, Solicitor of the Admiralty, immediately after the Conviction of such Offender or Offenders.

And, as a further Encouragement, His Majesty is pleased to promise His most gracious Pardon to any of the said Offenders, who shall, within the Time aforesaid, discover and prosecute to Conviction, any one or more, other or others, of the said Offenders.
