AT the Court at St. James's, the 13th Day of December, 1765,

P R E S E N T,

The KING's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

HIS Majesty having been pleased to appoint his Grace Thomas Holles Duke of Newcastle, to be Lord Lieutenant of the County of Nottingham, and of the Town of Nottingham and County of the same, his Grace this Day took the Oaths appointed to be taken thereupon, instead of the Oaths of Allegiance and Supremacy.

Copenhagen, November 30. The Court goes into Mourning tomorrow for Four Weeks, for his late Royal Highness the Duke of Cumberland and for the Margravine of Brandenburg Schwedt, the King of Prussia's Sister.

St James's, December 13.

This Day His Majesty was pleased to fill up one of the vacant Stalls of the most Honourable Military Order of the Bath.

The Sovereign having put on the Ribbon with the Symbol of the Order hanging to it, the Gentleman Usher bearing the Rod, and habited in the Mantle of the Order, introduced Andrew Mitchell, Esq; His Majesty's Minister Plenipotentiary to the King of Prussia, a Gentleman Usher daily Waiter carrying the Sword of State, which was delivered to the Sovereign by a Knight of the Order, Mr. Mitchell kneeling, was knighted with the Sword of State: Then the Earl Delaware, having received the Ribbon with the Badge of the Order from the Register, (in the Absence of Bath King of Arms) presented the same to the Sovereign, who put the Ribbon over the new-made Knight's Right Shoulder; then he had the Honour of kissing His Majesty's Hand; which done, he rose up and withdrew.

The Ceremony was performed, immediately after the Levee, in His Majesty's Closet, several of the Great Officers of the Court being present.

Whereas my Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty have received authentick Information, that between the Hours of Eight and Nine o'Clock in the Evening of the 18th Day of July last, as a Merchant-Ship or Galliot, called the Lady Gabitha of Bremen, Hendrick Beckman, Master, laden with Linen Cloth and other Merchandise, was sailing from Bremen, for the Port of Bristol, the said Ship or Galliot was piratically and feloniously attacked on the High Sea, in the British Channel, off Beachy-Head, by a Ship or Vessel looking like a Cutter, with a long English Pendant, the Master and Crew whereof, being Englishmen, did then and there, by Force, plunder and rob the said Ship or Galliot called the Lady Gabitha, of a great Quantity of Linen Cloth, to a considerable Value in Violation of the Laws of Nations; Their Lordships therefore, in order to detect and bring to Justice the Persons guilty of the said Piracy and Robbery, are pleased to promise a Reward of Five Hundred Pounds unto or amongst such Person or Persons as shall, within Six Months from this Time, discover any of the Offenders guilty of the above-mentioned Offence, so as such Offender or Offenders shall be apprehended and duly convicted thereof: Which Reward shall be paid, clear of all Deductions whatsoever, by Samuel Seddon, Esquire, Solicitor of the Admiralty, immediately after the Conviction of such Offender or Offenders.

And, as a further Encouragement, His Majesty is pleased to promise His most gracious Pardon to any of the said Offenders, who shall, within the Time aforesaid, discover and prosecute to Conviction, any one or more, other or others, of the said Offenders.
