The KING's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

THIS Day the Right Honourable George Sackville, Esq; commonly called Lord George Sackville, was, by His Majesty's Command, sworn of His Majesty's most Honourable Privy Council, and took his Place at the Board accordingly.

Warsaw, November 27. The Day before Yesterday, being the Anniversary of his Polish Majesty's Coronation, the Foreign Ministers had the Honor of making him their Congratulations upon that Occasion.

Madrid, December 2. His Catholick Majesty and all the Royal Family arrived here in perfect Health last Thursday the 28th past; and Yesterday the Festivals were to have begun, but are put off for a few Days on Account of the Princess of Asturias having a little feverish Disorder; but her Royal Highness is already much better.

Venice, December 4. On Saturday last Signor Foscarì, who was Bailo at Constantinople, and Signor Ziepolo, elder Brother of the late Venetian Ambassador in France, were chosen Ambassadors Extraordinary to the Court of Vienna, to congratulate the Emperor on his Accession to the Imperial Throne.

Berlin, December 7. A few Days ago his Royal Highness Prince Henry, the King of Prussia's Brother, with the Princess his Consort, arrived from his Country Seat at Rhinsberg, in this Capital, in order to pass the Winter Season.

St. James's, December 21.

The King has been pleased to constitute and appoint the Right Hon. John Earl of Egmont, of the Kingdom of Ireland, and ~~the Right Hon. Lord Lovel~~ Lord Lovel and Holland, of Enmore in the County of Somerset in the Kingdom of Great Britain, Sir Charles Saunders, Knt. of the Bath, Augustus Keppel, and Charles Townshend, Esqrs. Sir William Meredith, Bart. John Buller, and John Yorke, Esqrs. to be Commissioners for Executing the Office of High Admiral of Great Britain and Ireland, and the Dominions, Islands and Territories thereunto respectively belonging.
