**O**N Sunday last, between Three and Four o'Clock in the Afternoon, died, at his House in Leicester-Square, his Royal Highness Prince Frederick-William, His Majesty's youngest Brother, to the great Grief of their Majesties, and all the Royal Family.

Last Friday between 30 and 40 Sail of Merchant Ships, under Convoy of two of his most Faithful Majesty's Ships put to Sea for the different Settlements in the Brazils and the Coast of Africa.

*Berlin, December 21.* Last Night the Prince Royal of Prussia, with the Princess his Consort, came to Town from Potzdam; and this Morning his Majesty, accompanied by his Brother Prince Henry, and a numerous Retinue, arrived here likewise from Potzdam.
