Naples, December 24.

A Spanish Man of War arrived in the Port of Baia near this Capital, on Saturday last.

The Weather has been very rainy and bad of late. Mount Vesuvius threatens an Eruption, having, with great Noise, thrown up hot Cinders for several Days past, and at Night the Flame on the Top is very visible; which has not been the Case since the Year 1760, the Date of the last Eruption.

Venice, December 27. The Senate has at length appointed Cavalier Tron to treat with the Imperial Ambassador here, about settling the Affairs of the Posts, which were left undetermined, in the late Conferences at Ostiglia, between the Austrian and Venetian Commissaries.

Last Week Signor Colombo, late Venetian Resident in England, was chosen Great Chancellor of this Republic in the Room of Signor Bartolini lately deceased: Upon which Ocasion he gave three Publick Balls, with Concerts of Music, Illuminations, and Fireworks, as usual, to which the Foreign Ministers were invited. He likewise gave Money, Bread, and Wine to the Populace.

Roma, December 28. On Christmas Day the Emperor, and Empress his Consort, received, as usual, the Compliments of the Ambassadors, Foreign Ministers, and Principal Nobility here. On Thursday Prince Albert of Saxony was declared a Field Marshal in this Service, and Commander in Chief of Hungary.
