**B**aron Osten, late the Danish Envoy at the Court of Petersburg, arrived here some Days ago from that City, in his Way to Copenhagen.

Berlin, January 18. Last Saturday, being the Birth-day of Prince Henry, the King of Prussia's Brother, his Royal Highness received, in the Morning, from the Nobility and Foreign Ministers here, the Compliments usual on this Occasion. In the Evening the Queen of Prussia gave a most magnificent Supper: The Feast ended with a Ball, which lasted till early next Morning. Last Night his Majesty, who is in perfect Health, supped with his Brother Prince Henry, in his Royal Highness's new Palace.

Copenhagen, January 18. M. de Revenflau, late Governor to his Majesty, is appointed Grand Chamberlain, which has been vacant many Years.
