The KING's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

**T**HIS Day his Grace Charles Duke of Dorset was, by His Majesty's Command, sworn of His Majesty's most Honourable Privy Council, and took his Place at the Board accordingly.

His Majesty having been pleased to appoint his Grace Charles Duke of Dorset to be Lord Lieutenant of the County of Kent, and of the City of Canterbury and County of the same, his Grace this Day took the Oaths appointed to be taken thereupon, instead of the Oaths of Allegiance and Supremacy.

Berlin, February 1. Last Night the Opera of Lucius Papirius was acted here for the last Time; after which the Prince Royal of Prussia gave, in his Apartment in the Palace, a grand Supper and a Masquerade Ball to the Royal Family and Chief Nobility, which lasted till Two o'Clock this Morning. The Diversions of the Carnival being now over, it is expected his Majesty will, in a very few Days, return to Potsdam.
