PUrsuant to an Act of Parliament passed in the Twenty Sixth Year of His late Ma- jesty's Reign, this is to give Notice to the Con- cerned, that Information has been sent to this Office, That on the 3d instant, the Ship Jane and Elizabeth of Whitby, of the Burthen of about 120 Tons, whereof John Trewfitt was Master, bound from Southampton to Leith, la- den with Bark, having sustained some Damage in bad Weather, was obliged to put into Yar- mouth Roads, and rode there till the 7th Instant, when she drove very near Yarmouth Bar, and the Wind blowing hard, the Master was obliged; for the Preservation of the Ship and Cargoe, and the Lives of the People, to run her on the Main; but that it was expected, that both the Ship and Cargoe would be saved.
