THIS Day His Majesty came to the House of Peers, and being in His Royal Robes seated on the Throne with the usual Solemnity, Sir Francis Molineux, Knt. Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, was sent with a Message from His Majesty to the House of Commons, commanding their Attendance in the House of Peers. The Commons being come thither accordingly, His Majesty was pleased to give the Royal Assent to,

An Act for continuing, and granting to His Majesty, certain Duties upon Malt, Mum, Cyder and Perry, for the Service of the Year One Thousand Seven Hundred and Sixty-six.

An Act to continue an Act, made in the last Session of Parliament, intituled, An Act for Importation of Salted-Beef, Pork, Bacon, and Butter, from Ireland, for a limited Time.

An Act to prohibit the Exportation of Corn, Grain, Malt, Meal, Flour, Bread, Biscuit, and Starch, for a limited Time.

An Act for allowing the Importation of Corn and Grain, from His Majesty's Colonies in America into this Kingdom, for a limited Time, free of Duty.

An Act for allowing the Importation of Oats and Oatmeal into this Kingdom, for a limited Time, Duty free.

An Act for repairing, widening, and keeping in Repair, the Road leading from Tunbridge Wells, in the County of Kent, to the Cross Ways, near Maresfield Street, in the County of Sussex.

An Act to enable Thomas Kymmer, Esquire, to make a Navigable Cut, or Canal, from Little Gwendraeth River, near the Town of Kidwely, to the Great Forest and Pwll Llygod, in the County of Carmarthen.

An Act for extending the Provisions of an Act, made in the last Session of Parliament, for the more easy and speedy Recovery of Small Debts, within the Hundred of Blackheath, of Bromley and Beckenham, of Rokeley, otherwise Ruxley, and of Little and Lessness, in the County of Kent, to the Hundred of Wallington, in the County of Surrey.
