St. James's, March 11.

ON Sunday Evening last, the young Prince, Son of their Serene and Royal Highnesses the Prince and Princess of Brunswick and Lunenburgh, was Christened by his Grace the Archbishop of Canterbury, and named Charles-George-Augustus: The Sponsors were, His Majesty; his most Serene Highness Charles Reigning Duke of Brunswick and Lunenburgh, for whom his Royal Highness the Duke of York was Proxy; the Queen; and her Royal Highness the Princess Dowager of Wales.

Copenhagen, March 1. The Remains of the late King are now placed under a very magnificent Castrum Doloris in the Royal Chapel, and are to be removed, with the usual Solemnity, on the 18th of this Month, to the Cathedral of Rottchild, the Repository of the Danish Monarchs.

Count Fink, who was General of the Infantry, Colonel of the Holstein Regiment, and lately one of the Deputies in the Directory of War, died here, after a short inflammatory Illness, on the 23d past. He left the Prussian Service, and entered into That of Denmark about a Year ago.

On the 24th past M. Volkerfahn, the Saxon Minister, had an Audience of the King of Denmark; at which he presented his new Credentials to his Danish Majesty.

M. d'Osten, who was lately the Danish Envoy at Petersbourg, returned hither a few Days ago. He brought along with him the Order of St. Alexander, which the Empress of Russia had presented to him at his Departure. Upon his Arrival here, he found a Packet from the King of Poland, containing the Order of St. Stanislaus. This Minister will soon set out again, with his former Character, for the Court of Naples, where M. Morin, an English Gentleman of French Extraction, is to attend him, as well in Quality of Secretary of Legation, as of Consul-General for Denmark in the Ports of Italy.

The Grand Marshal is so far recovered as to assist in Council, and appear abroad again.

Hague, March 7. The Prince of Orange has appointed Sunday next, to receive the Compliments of the Ambassadors.
