Lisbon, March 1.

WE have had the coldest Winter ever known in Portugal: The Frost set in at Christmas, and lasted about Six Weeks; since that Time we have had mild open Weather, with constant Rain; this gives us the Prospect of a plentiful Year.

The Fleet from the Rio de Janeiro, which consisted of Eight and Twenty Merchant Ships, and one East-India Ship from Goa, under Convooy of a Man of War, sailed from the Rio de Janeiro the 18th of November. Two of the Merchantmen, soon after they sailed, sprung a Leak, and put back: The Man of War, with the Indiaman, and Two and Twenty Merchant Ships, after a Passage of a Hundred Days, arrived here on Wednesday the 26th of February, and the other Four being bound for Oporto, proceeded on their Voyage to that Port.

Lisbon, March 5. The Hampden and King George Packets arrived here on Monday last, in Nine Days from Falmouth.

Their most Faithful Majesties and the Royal Family returned from Salvateria on Monday Morning the 3d Instant, and the next Day their Majesties received the Compliments of the Foreign Ministers upon this Occasion.

The Vulture Sloop, Captain Robinson, is arrived from Gibraltar.

Florence, March 8. By the last Post the Great Duke received Notice from Vienna, that the Empress had given him the Military Rank of Marshal, which has afforded him great Pleasure.

It having been usual for the different Bodies of Foreign Merchants settled at Leghorn to shew their Respect to the Sovereigns of this Dutchy the first Time they appeared there, the English Merchants have asked and obtained Leave of the Great Duke to make a Diversion called a Calcio, when his Royal Highness goes there this Spring: The other Nations have followed their Example, and each is to make some Publick Shew on that Occasion.

Whereas it has been humbly represented to the King, That Catharine Ogilvie, who was convicted at Edinburgh of Incest and poisoning her Husband, but her Sentence reversed on Account of her Pregnancy, and who, about Three Weeks ago, was delivered of a Child in Prison, and was to have received Sentence of Death on Monday the 17th instant, had made her Escape out of Prison on Saturday the 15th instant, about Seven o'Clock in the Evening; That her Escape was not discovered or made known to the Magistrates till the next Day between One and Two in the Afternoon, when a Search was immediately made through the City, and a Messenger dispatched to endeavour to trace, and, if possible, overtake her on the London Road; but all the Intelligence he could get was, That a young Gentleman, very thin and sickly, muffled up in a Great Coat, and attended by a Servant, had passed through Huddington on Saturday at Midnight, and had passed on, with four Horses, Day and Night, from Stage to Stage, towards London; His Majesty, for the better discovering and bringing her to Justice, is graciously pleased to order a Reward of One Hundred Guineas to any Person or Persons, who shall apprehend her; to be paid by the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of the Treasury.
