Whereas it has been humbly represented to the King, That on the 6th Day of December, 1764, between the Hours of Eight and Nine in the Evening, a most audacious and wicked Attempt was made to assassinate Thomas Walker, Esq; of Montreal, one of His Majesty's Justices of the Peace for that District, by a Number of Persons in Disguise, who, after giving him above Fifty Wounds and Contusions, many of them of the most dangerous Nature, left him for Dead, but not till they had cut off a Part of his Right Ear, which they carried away in Triumph: His Majesty, for the better discovering and bringing to Justice the Persons concerned in this felonious Attack, is graciously pleased to promise His Royal Pardon to any one of the said Offenders, who shall voluntarily surrender himself to any of His Majesty's Justices of the Peace in Great Britain or Ireland, or in the Province of Canada, or any other of His Majesty's Dominions, and who shall make a full Discovery of his Accomplices, so that they may be apprehended and convicted thereof; and also a Reward of One Hundred Guineas, to be paid by the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, upon the Conviction of any one or more of the

Offenders principally concerned in the said Facts: And further, That if such Evidence shall happen to be in any Regiment in His Majesty's Service, he shall, if he desires it, have his free Discharge.
