St. James's, April 22.

THE Ratifications of a Convention for the final Adjustment of the Canada Bills were this Day exchanged with his Excellency the Count de Guerchy, Ambassador from the most Christian King.

Stockholm, April 4. Yesterday being the Day appointed for the Publick Declaration of the Prince Royal's intended Marriage with the Princess of Denmark, the Deputies of the States went in Procession to Court at Noon; to make their Compliments on the Occasion; and, as soon as that was over, the Foreign Ministers were admitted to make theirs: About half an Hour after One, the King, Queen, and Two eldest Princes, dined in Publick; at which Ceremony the Foreign Ministers likewise attended, and were afterwards entertained at Dinner along with the Senators and other Persons of Distinction.

The Deputies of the States also dined at Court, every Order having a separate Table; and the Number of Persons entertained on this Occasion amounted to between Five and Six Hundred. The whole was concluded by a Ball at Court in the Evening.

The Report which had been spread, as if the new Dey of Algiers had declared War against Sweden, and sent their Consul away, proves to be false, and it is contradicted in a Paragraph published by Authority in the Swedish Gazette of Yesterday.

Lisbon, April 5. On St. Joseph's Day, the 19th of March, which is the King of Portugal's Name-day, the New College of Nobles instituted by his Majesty for the Education of the young Nobility from the Age of Eight to Fifteen Years old, was opened with a Latin Oration pronounced by M. Sciera, one of the Professors, in Presence of their Majesties and the whole Court. This Establishment is for an Hundred Scholars.

Monday the 31st of March, being her most Faithful Majesty's Birth-day, the Foreign Ministers and the Nobility waited upon their Majesties and the Royal Family, to pay the Compliments as usual upon such Occasions; and at Night there was a Burletta Opera in the King's private Theatre.

On Monday Night the 31st past, the Admiral Stevens India man, John Griffin, Commander, from Bengal, after a tedious Voyage of Six Months, put in here to refit.

Berlin, April 12. Last Wednesday his Royal Highness Prince Henry the King of Prussia's Brother arrived in this Capital from his Country-seat at Rhinsberg, and the next Day went to Spandau, where he will remain some Time, in order to exercise and prepare his Regiment for the ensuing Review.

M. de Verelt; the Dutch Minister at this Court, having obtained Leave from the States-General to go to Holland for some Weeks to settle his private Affairs, set out from hence Yesterday for the Hague, by the Way of Potzdam.

Hague, April 18. The West-India Company of this Republick has granted the same Privileges and Authority to the Prince of Orange as the East-India Company had done before; and Yesterday a Deputation from their Corporation presented his Serene Highness with the Commission of Director and Governor-General of the Company.
