Whereas I have received Information from his Excellency the Earl of Hertford, His Majesty's Lieutenant General and General Governor of the Kingdom of Ireland, That Part of the Cargo and Treasure of the Ship Earl of Sandwich, whereof John Cochran was late Commander. (who in his Voyage in her, from Terriff to London, was, together with Captain Glas, his Wife and Daughter, Passengers, and some others belonging to the said Ship, barbarously murdered by Part of the Crew thereof) having been found on the Coast of Ireland, is now properly secured in that Kingdom by his Excellency's Order; I give this Publick Notice thereof, to the End, that all Persons concerned in the Treasure and Cargo of the said Ship, so found and secured as above-mentioned, may, without Loss of Time, authorize proper Persons to lay in their Claims, in the Lord Lieutenant of Ireland's Chief Secretary's Office in Dublin Castle, and agree upon a Method for settling and ascertaining their respective Properties and Proportions.
